Dear Friends,

So here and now, we commit ourselves once again, and in all good hope, to the wondrous purposes of our gracious God—through Jesus Christ our Lord.



Fear

Margaret Silf is an author of a book entitled, *Sacred Spaces: Stations on a Celtic Way*. I would like to share one particular passage from this book about fear. In this passage Silf suggests a dialogue of Peter's fear while in a boat with the other disciples during a storm.

"It's too bad he sent us off into this weather on our own," one of them complained, "when the wind is against us."



"He's gone into the hills to pray," another interrupted. "I guess his prayer is more powerful than anything we can do out here in this wind. Let's trust it."

They struggled on, as the wind speed increased relentlessly and the boat was pit pitched like a cork among the thrashing waves. It was then that they noticed a shadowy figure coming towards them through the spray. In the dark, and in their fear, they thought they were seeing a ghost. What else would be coming so close here in the middle of the lake, if not some apparition conjured up by their overwearied minds. But they all saw it, whatever it was. That much was sure.

They fell silent, in terror, cowering in the depths of the boat. Until a familiar voice reached them through the howling of the wind. "Don't be afraid. It's me."

Peter was the first to find his voice: "Lord, is this real? If this is really you, and not some fearful fantasy, call me to come to you across the water."

The others were aghast. What did Peter think he was saying? Had he completely taken leave of his senses? And then the calm, penetrating voice replied, "Come!"

Everyone held their breath. What would Peter do now, they asked themselves, but no one dared to speak. Peter himself began to shake. They watched as his face grew tense and the knuckles of his clenched hands whitened. He stepped back, shocked, from the edge of the boat. For a moment he clutched his head with both hands, as if gulping for courage from his closed palms. Then, with a single, determined leap, he vaulted over the side of the boat.

For just a few moments time stood still that night, there in the vortex of the storm. Creation itself seemed to freeze into an expectant stillness as Peter made those first steps of pure faith across the water to his Lord. His entire being was focused on the figure out there in front of him, standing on the water. His whole life energy was pouring into this one single act of total trust, and his eyes were fixed on his friend, standing with outstretched arms, waiting to receive him.

Then for a split second that steady gaze was distracted by the sight of an approaching wave. Peter lost his focus. Fear took in his panic, and immediately those outstretched arms were round his waist, drawing him gently back on board the boat. "It was the fear that let you down," Jesus explained to him, without reproach. "Let the fear go, and you will discover a whole new layer of trust underneath, and things will become possible that you could never have imagined."

Peter lay, trembling, in the bottom of the boat. But he had learned the measure of himself that night. And he had recognized the true stature of his friend.

Thursdays at Three

"'The Question of God,' with Sigmund Freud, C. S. Lewis—and Carl Jung, Too"

Beginning on **Thursday, September 13, at 3:00 p.m.** in the Parish Hall, Brian Skea and Father Adam will offer a five-part series, "The Question of God." This is an award-winning PBS presentation on the basic questions of human existence, seen through the differing perspectives of Sigmund Freud and C. S. Lewis. Drawing on Brian's expertise, we will add Carl Jung to the mix, as well.

Each of our sessions will conclude with viewing a DVD portion from the original PBS program. We will add own group reflection and conversation. Sessions will conclude at about 4:15 p.m.

How do we view reality? Is science incompatible with revelation? Have we created God or has God created us? Why believe?

Come ponder and explore together!

"In self-giving we touch a rhythm not only of all creation but of all being. They did not know the first rule of the holy game, which is that every player must by all means touch the ball and then immediately pass it on. To be found with it in your hands is a fault: to cling to it, death. But when it flies to and fro among the players too swift for the eye to follow, and the great Master himself leads the revelry, giving himself to His creatures in the generation, and back to Himself in the sacrifice, of the Word, then indeed the eternal dance 'makes heaven drowsy with the harmony'. All pains and pleasures we have known on earth are early intimations in the movements of that dance: but the dance itself is strictly incomparable with the sufferings of this present time."

Our willingness to give cheerfully is as important as the amount we give. We should strive to fulfill our financial commitments that include stewardship. When we give it should be unconditional as a response and reflection of our own devotion *to* Christ and not for anything we can "get out of it."

The wonderful children's poem says it so well...

"Here's the church;
Here's the steeple;
Open the door and see all the people"

Belle of Amherst +

During six days in August, the Church of the Holy Spirit engaged in a new venture. A play, "The Belle of Amherst," in conjunction with Ron and Linn Jacoby, was presented to more than two hundred and twenty people. Linn played Emily Dickinson in this one-woman adaptation of the William Luce's play which was created for Julie Harris. The play and especially Linn's performance received wonderful reviews from the *Cape Cod Times* and the *Cape Codder*.

We had great support from a group of our own CHS volunteers, The Friends of the Play, and we thank them..

Linn, Ron, her husband and director, plus three backstage associates donated their time and talent to the Church of the Holy Spirit as a fund raiser for the church. This was really a wonderful thing for them to have done and we thank them profusely. The play generated \$4,149, but expenses for the rights to the play, advertising/printing and our Sexton left us with a net of \$1,783.

Those parishioners who attended the production were also full of praise for Linn and the group. If you weree not able to come, you missed a wonderful evening of theater at our church. Linn and Ron are planning to present another production in the future.

As this was a fundraiser for the church, we tithed the net proceeds to go to an outreach agency, this time to Independence House, helping battered women and children.

Thank you for your kind words, Sharyn. I'm not sure how creative and exciting I am, but I thought others might be interested in my little community project. These pieces are less artistic than the usual CHS exhibits; I tend to create utilitarian items, as you can tell from the fact that I'm currently apprenticing to learn slipcover making! Nonetheless, I hope you enjoy learning about the Million Pillowcase Challenge. The goal of the project is to encourage sewers to create one million pillowcases for community charities. Children in hospitals, homeless shelters and in foster care can benefit from the donation of a cheerful pillowcase to lift spirits and extend a certain sense of caring. Quilters and seamstress who donate their projects add to an online counter. Two years into the project, the count is now approaching a half a million!

Because I've written a number of fundraising appeals for the Children's Hospital of Memphis, an affiliate of St. Jude's Children's Hospital, I decided to make a pillowcase a month during 2012 for young patients there. Some fabric came from my old stash of quilting material, other yardage came from St. Joan of Arc and St. Vincent de Paul thrift shops, and some was purchased when a special idea bounced into my head (Ninja warrior, anyone?). My taste does seem to run to the girlier prints, so I've made an effort to include some boyish creations, too. I hope you'll enjoy my modest show.
