Dear Friends,

Hard to believe, but Lent is days way. I want to again share with you an important element in our journey to Easter this year.

It is our series, "**Wednesdays in Lent (and a little bit of Easter) 2019.**" We'll be working with a wonderful, approachable and practical title by Eugene Peterson:

Practice Resurrection: A Conversation on Growing Up in Christ

However, this is not a book study! (Although, reading the book would certainly be a helpful option.) There is a short study guide to the book, with summaries, pithy quotes, and group questions. **It's the study guide that we'll want everyone to have.**

We will meet in the Parish Hall on five Wednesdays in Lent, beginning on March 13th.

We will begin a 5:00 p.m. with our traditional Soup and Bread Supper. Reflections and Group Discussions will follow from 5:30 to 6:45 (in time for those going to choir rehearsal). We will break for Holy Week, and then finish with a **final session after Easter (Wednesday, April 24th)** that will include a potluck supper.

We will be asking people to **sign up ahead of time** so we can prepare well, purchase the study guides (and the whole book for those who want it), and put together the small groups, for discussion. I see this as an important opportunity to gather CHS folks from different services, and our many circles of ministry and fellowship, to learn and grow together: a great way, too, for longer-term CHS people to get to know those newer to us.

All participants will need the *Practice Resurrection Study Guide*. This is an inexpensive summary, with pithy quotes, sample session questions, and suggestions for prayer. We will be buying these in bulk based on how many sign up. **We'll ask for \$5 for the Study Guide to help cover our cost.** The **whole *Practice Resurrection* book**, by Peterson, is very good, not too long, but for the purposes of our series, **purely optional**. Some may surely find this helpful, however, and when registering, may order it from us, as well. **If you want to order the whole book, that will be an additional \$14 a copy.**

So, please register. You may do so on the sign up board for Wednesdays in Lent (etc.) in the Reception Room; letting us know if you wish just the study guide, or the whole book, along with the guide. We also will need folks to sign up for providing (vegetarian) Soup and Bread for the suppers. Or you may also sign up by e-mailing me with your information and reading material choice: rector@chsorleans.org

I am so looking forward to sharing this with as many of you as possible. (And if any will need child-care in order to participate, please let me know.) Signing up soon will be helpful for those involved in drawing plans together.

Lenten Sabbath Quiet Day: Saturday March 16 9:30 -1:00 in the Parish Hall

Our Quiet Day for Lent will focus on living into Sabbath time. “Sabbath: from Br. Jim Woodrum, SSJE “We hear an affirmation from Jesus of the need for Sabbath, not only a time for rest, but a time for rest with God. If you have ever been on a pilgrimage, you will know that the time immediately following the journey is one of rest, recollection, and especially remembering: a time to find meaning, to integrate the experience into your life, and to share that experience with Jesus in prayer.” We will be using our labyrinth, taking time for silence, for mediation and scripture, and reflection. We will also be exploring using and possibly making Anglican Prayer beads. (There will be more about that in the weeks to come.) Our day will end with a simple Contemplative Eucharist. A Baby Center (ABC) is among the most popular ministries of the Cape Cod Council of Churches.

These include both consultations and medical services as well as essential baby basics including diapers, baby wipes and clothing. Last year ABC provided over 50,000 baby essentials to needy children. BETTER STEWARDSHIP: Rethinking how much material we send by USPS mail

Each month we send more than 300 copies of our *Together* newsletter via regular mail. Each issue is 8 pages long. They need to be printed, collated, folded, addressed and prepared for mailing. Although we print *Together* 2-sided and use bulk mailing, it is still a significant undertaking every month, not to mention 1,200 sheets of paper and postage.

Several times a year we prepare 200+ Giving Statements, which also need to be printed, collated, folded, stuffed into envelopes and prepared for mailing. And although some Giving Statements are picked up at the church, most are mailed standard first class.

Beginning with the April issue of *Together*, we will be using email and our website as the primary way to deliver our newsletter to you. We will also use email as our primary way of sending your Giving Statements. We know you will agree this is better stewardship of our natural resources, time and money.

If we have your email address on file, we will use that. If we do not have an email address on file for you, you will continue to receive the TOGETHER and your Giving Statements by regular mail.



March is Brain Awareness Month

Do you know what an “acquired brain injury” (ABI) is? It is any injury to your brain that is NOT hereditary, congenital, degenerative or from a birth injury. Examples: stroke, trauma, tumor, infectious disease and more.

Traumatic Brain Injury is a subset of ABI and is caused by trauma to the brain from an external force. At least 2.5 million children and adults sustain TBIs in the U.S. each year!

About Us

This year we will celebrate the 10th anniversary of Adam Linton+’s ministry as our Rector.

This month we have the opportunity to learn more about both him and Lori.

+++++

Lori and Adam both were born and raised in the San Francisco Bay Area, Marin County, north of the Golden Gate Bridge. Lori, whose maiden name was Weaver, was the youngest of seven children. Adam was the elder of two. They met while studying together as music majors in college. By the time they were to become “an item,” Adam was already seminary-bound. Lori had to “persist” to get his attention (and Adam was very glad she did). They courted for a few months before becoming engaged shortly before Adam went off to the wilds of northeast Pennsylvania for his first round of theological studies. Adam, a very slight of build and a classical music major, soon to head off to seminary, was quite different than the other men in Lori’s life. Lori’s 5 highly-protective older brothers were each smart, but also burly, work-with-their-hands kind of guys. It was California, the ‘70s, so Adam’s long hair parted down the middle was part of his look. Lori wondered how boyfriend and brothers would hit it off. But they did, very well, and in the years to come, two of her brothers became some of Adam’s closest friends. They were married on July 17, 1977, in the summer after his first year of seminary, and shortly after, headed back there, together. They have five children, two grandchildren—and a third grandchild on the way.

Lori has a degree in music from College of Marin, Kentfield, California. She served as music minister in a number of congregations, some—but not all of these—parishes where Adam was priest. She has also directed community choirs and has been a consultant and coach for congregational music development. She also worked for a number of years in early childhood development, in particular with the Head Start program. She presently is an active member of the Chatham Chorale and its Chamber Singers.

Adam’s undergraduate studies were at College of Marin and the Russian Orthodox Seminary in South Canaan, Pennsylvania (with additional studies at Marywood College, Scranton). He holds his Master of Divinity degree from Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary, South Hamilton, Massachusetts. An avid reader (as evidenced by his extensive personal library), continuing education is a high priority for him. He is a noted student of Richard Hooker (the foundational Anglican theologian of the Sixteenth Century) and Karl Barth (considered the greatest Protestant theologian of the Twentieth Century), among others.

Both Lori and Adam were active in church in their youths, Lori as a Presbyterian. Adam was raised in the Episcopal Church. Then, after his family’s lengthy disconnection from church, after much spiritual questing, he experienced a re-conversion to Christ in Eastern Orthodoxy. However, as much as he and Lori enjoyed all their ministries, they were drawn (in Adam’s case, drawn back) to life as Episcopalians.

Adam was ordained in 1980 and has served parishes in Colorado and Massachusetts, as a Navy Chaplain and in Diocesan administration before “coming home” to the Episcopal Church in 1996. Since then, he served parishes in Illinois and Utah (and the Diocesan Standing Committee and as Deputy to the Episcopal Church’s General Convention). Adam and Lori had been at a parish in Utah for some eight years, and sensed that it was time for their “next phase” of ministry. The Church of the Holy Spirit appealed to them as a parish with much energy, desire for growth and as a potential very good fit for his gifts. Adam+ became our Rector in October 2009. He has a special passion for preaching, teaching, and fostering spiritual formation. He loves CHS, and feels it a wonderful privilege to serve among us.

Lori continues her active music interests, and in addition to sharing ministry with Adam at CHS, devotes much time to her grown children and grandchildren. Adam enjoys reading, not only continuing theological studies, but literature and history, in particular. He also writes on an ongoing basis. Both Lori and Adam love nature and kayaking—especially in their beloved Montana. And they both delight in the company of their active two-year old Yellow Labrador Retriever, Polly.

One passion they share is a connection with Glacier National Park, Montana, that goes back almost twenty-five years. That’s a longer connection than any other one place they’ve lived. They have spent many special summers, for them and their children, at the historic Kelly’s Camp, on the far shore of Lake MacDonald. They hike trails, high and low, kayak lakes, swim in icy waters, and travel throughout the Park. They love its sacred beauty and grandeur. Even though Adam has a bit of an issue with heights, every visit to the park includes a drive over the Continental Divide on the aptly named Going-to-the-Sun Highway (but he wouldn’t miss it for anything). Two of their children now live in Montana, as does Adam’s sister. In 2017 they bought a home out there, less than thirty minutes’ drive to the Park’s West Entrance.

The Lintons look forward to celebrating their 10th Anniversary with CHS this year and continued growth and sharing with our parish.

Vestry Meeting Highlights – Thursday January 17th.

Transitions:

- Adam+ reported that Sharon Laughton and Brooke Eaton-Skea will conclude their service to the Church School at the end of this school year.
- Jack Nixon will conclude his work guiding the lectors and LEM's. Adam+ has welcomed and trained ten new LEM's.
- Lori Linton will assume coordination of the Lector and LEM assignments.

Outreach: The Outreach Committee is looking at other organizations to add to the ministries we support.

Stewardship:

- The Stewardship campaign will begin in July.
- Since we continue to have people who give on a regular basis but do not pledge, the campaign will include additional education on the importance of making a pledge.

Treasurer's Report:

- The 2018 year ended well with \$132 surplus!
- This result was due to additional funds that were received in December including \$5,000 from the year end appeal and fund raising events (Rummage Sale, Antique Show and Bazaar).
- At this point there was no final decision from the Diocese on our revised Diocesan Assessment Recommendation (10%). So, a provisional budget will be presented at the annual meeting.
- We received the first installment of a substantial bequest from the Chapman Endowment Fund which will be invested in the DIT.
- Chris Crighton has been approved by the Vestry as Assistant Treasurer for 2019 with the hope he will become Treasurer in 2020.


