The 2019 Food4Kids program began serving meals and snacks on June 24th! Once again, we are delivering meals from Harwich to Provincetown and all of the towns in between. We expect to serve 400-500 children each day for the nine weeks of summer programs they attend. All of our sites from the past several summers are back, and we have added new sites at the Eastham Library two days a week and the Harwich Arts Center every day.

Staff has been hired, site personnel and volunteers have been trained, food and supplies have been ordered, and Food4Kids is fully operational each weekday all summer in the CHS kitchen and Gathering Room of the Parish Hall. Anne Marie Mullin has returned as our Operations Manager, and Gerard and Mary are back as her assistants.

The Steering Committee created a new position over the winter—Program Director. Laura Froeschner has been hired and she will visit the meal sites, administer the book program and help out at the church as needed. and is serving as our Operations Manager this summer. She will be joined by Mary O'Reilly as Kitchen Manager and Gerard Costa as Program Assistant. Each day, this capable team will be guiding and assisting our wonderful team and wonderful group of faithful volunteers from CHS and the community beyond.

We do still have some opportunities to volunteer preparing the sandwiches in the kitchen from 7:30 – 9:30 a.m. or packing the lunches in the Gathering Room from 9:30 – 10:30 a.m. ***We especially need more volunteers on Mondays and Fridays at the end of July and the for the entire month of August.*** There are also a few opportunities to deliver the food to one of our communities one day each week.

About Us

Everyone in Orleans knows Bonnie Snow as the lady who gives historical walks around Orleans as the Orleans Historical Society's Official Historian. She is also a tremendous source of history and the historian of The Church of the Holy Spirit.

Bonnie MacGregor Snow was born in 1937 and grew up in Chatham. Her father was a friend of CHS' first Rector, the Reverend Richard Kimball. Bonnie is the 1st baby baptized at The Church of the Holy Spirit by Reverend Kimball. After her father passed away, her mother worked in people's homes and took care of the elderly.

Bonnie attended CHS on Sundays, getting a ride from the parish organist and choir master who lived in Chatham. She sang in the choir and was involved in many church functions. She fondly remembers the Kimballs' dog, Spinnaker, who would follow the choir in and lay down in front of the altar, and Lady Duberry, their Persian cat, who would lay down on the altar with the money plate... guarding the gold!

Bonnie had an opportunity to go to High School off Cape. She graduated from Northfield School for girls near Greenfield and North Hampton and then enrolled in Boston Children's Hospital School of Nursing and became a pediatric nurse in the open heart surgery department.

One summer she chose to be the camp nurse for Camp Viking off Namequoit point in South Orleans. Her mother had taken a job in Eastham near the Town Hall. So, she was able to stay with her. One weekend she went on a blind date to Doane Rock in Eastham where she met Stanley Snow, a native of Cape Cod. After one year dating, the couple were married in 1959 by Reverend Kimball at The Church of the Holy Spirit.

The Snow family are direct descendants of Stephen Hopkins, whose family arrived on the Mayflower in 1620. The ancestors of the Snow family were one of the seven families to settle Eastham and its offshoot, Orleans. In the 1870s, Captain Aaron Snow transported coal, grain, and other items along the eastern coast aboard the merchant ship Nettie M. Rogers. He first conducted business from a shed and wharf he owned on Town Cove. Captain Aaron's son and daughter-in-law, William and Annie Snow, established the first official Snow's store in 1887 at the site of the current Orleans Inn. It was and still is known as "the everything store".

Stanley was born at Bonnie's grandmother's the maternity home in Eastham. He attended K-12 in Orleans Schools and was the Jr. Commodore at the Orleans Yacht club. After High School, with his love of boats and being on the water, he moved to Florida and worked on yachts. He then served in the Korean War using his boating knowledge in rescue missions. After the war, he moved back to Orleans and has worked in Snows ever since. Stanley is miniature train collector and the "Station Master" of the train scape at Snows that attracts many train enthusiasts – young and old.

Newly married, Bonnie and Stanley lived in an apartment over the original store. Stan's father bought a summer cottage on Gibson Road overlooking the Eastern shore of Town Cove. Bonnie & Stanley live in it during one summers as his parents traveled around England. When Stan's father built another home next to the cottage, Bonnie and Stanley moved into the cottage and winterized it. They raised three children and continue to live there. Son James works at Snow's Home & Garden Store, Alan is the town tree warden in Amherst MA and Julie lives in Virginia with her family. The Snow Family compound along Gibson Road and Town Cove now includes the homes of brothers Bill and Robert Snow and many other generations of Snow descendants.

While Stanley worked at Snows, Bonnie was a full-time mother and also care giver to her in-laws and became the "neighborhood nurse." She learned about Orleans through people she met along the way and that got her involved with the Historical Society, and, in her own words, "Eats it up!"

Bonnie brought an interesting book to our interview; "Of Ghosts and Angels", written by Doris Cheny Whitehouse who spent many summers in Orleans on Crystal Lake and includes many wonderful stories of days spent with the Kimballs. The cover leaflet also includes the following book description:

"We walk beside Doris (twelve years old) as she wanders into the enchanted garden behind the tiny Church of the Holy Spirit in Orleans on Cape Cod. It is here she discovers the Kimballs – Florence and Dick – in that hallowed spot where Richard Bowland Kimball began his ministry in his sixtieth year. We rejoice in the presence of these tenacious angels who all through the pages of this book are hovering overhead, demanding permission to land.

In 1953, against all odds, Doris gives birth to their only child. She is named Paula Kimball Whithouse and is called Kim...The author puts forth an exciting challenge to "Look up – look up and remember!". She says, "Get in touch with the angels that hover overhead and grant them permission to land!" Their message may provide the only truly enduring legacy we can leave for our children."

I am so happy Bonnie introduced me to this book. With some research, I was able to track down Doris Whitehouse's daughter, Kim. She has given me permission to reproduce the sections of her mother's memoir that include memories of Orleans, CHS and the Kimballs. These will appear in the coming months "About Us" section of **Together. Stay Tuned!** Kim has given us two copies of her mother's memoir which will be available to borrow from the CHS Library... AND... Kim has also bequeathed to CHS a Vernon Smith wooden panel that had been her mother's. CHS will receive this when she and her husband downsize in a few years. **Sue S.**

Cape and Islands Deanery Assembly in Woods Hole, May 9, 2019 at Church of the Messiah.

This was the first Diocesan meeting in the newly converted old Church of the Messiah.

Connie Melahoures gave an update on Diocesan grant requests. The Rev. Terry Pannell, Dean and Rector of St. Mary's, Provincetown has applied for a Stokes grant for \$40K for repairs to their sea wall and other items. The Assembly voted to support a grant of \$1,500 to St. David's South Yarmouth for their Paper Pantry. There is still grant money available from the Diocese.

Connie described the work of Amazing Grace which helps children of incarcerated families. They send children to a camp which gives them experiences they would never get at home.

The Deanery and the Diocese are concerned about small parishes being unable to support full-time rectors. The Rev. Kelly A. O'Connell is the Regional Canon for the southern region. Many parishes are in transition and are relying on part-time retired clergy to fill their needs. New retirees are tending to retire completely.

The Diocese is looking at how to communicate between the Diocesan Council and Deaneries, and how to develop leadership so that there are no uncontested elections. New members were voted in to Deanery Executive Committee positions.

The main event of the evening was a thorough presentation on NARCAN and opioid addiction, which is a disease, not a moral failing. 192 people a day in the US are dying from this.

NEW CHS MINISTRY OF INTERCESSORY PRAYER

Dear Parishioners,

We're writing to share with you news of a "re-imagined" ministry at Church of the Holy Spirit. As you know, the Vestry has engaged in an extensive review of all our parish activities, to help us carry out our mission even more effectively. We have been in many conversations, and committed much of our own time reflecting and discerning. A number of ministries are stepping forward with new approaches; a number have been streamlined or consolidated.

After substantial consideration, the Vestry discerned that it is time for the ministry of intercessory prayer at CHS take a new form. We're continuing with the weekly Blue Sheet's public Prayer List, which we hope many will use for their prayers.

In place of the former Prayer Chain, which was emailed, a new ministry, "Intercessors," has been established. It will be a small group of current, fully active members of CHS. The Intercessors will continue the functions of the former Prayer Chain. It will now also meet in person, as a group, for prayer together, periodically throughout the year. Plans are being developed, too, to be available to pray in person with people who wish it, either before or after some of our regular worship services.




