

# **INTERIM RECTOR'S REPORT**

- Debra+ discussed the fact that it has been more than 10-years since we last called a Rector and the challenges that presents to the congregation. She then went on to briefly identify and review a series of focus point that are listed below.
- **History**: Who are we? Who is God calling us to be? During this time, we will identify what has worked and letting go of what no longer serves the Parish
- **Connection**: Working not only among ourselves but also out in the community; how has demographics changed who we are and who we will become.
- **Leadership**: What are the gifts, skills for ministry? How are we using them? Training is key as is inviting new folks into leadership. Continually re-imagining who we are and want to be as well as introducing new ministries (e.g., safe church training, etc.)
- **Future**: What kinds of gifts and skills do we commit bring alongside of our new rector to work towards a new future.
- **Vestry work**: Rector's function as visitor but the parishioners constitute the permanent body of the church.
  - o Identifying the deep core values that we carry into our future future must be consistent with core values
  - Working with the Diocese has been challenging Debra+ has had a positive experience with the Diocese and will work toward renewing, reworking our relationship with the Diocese
  - o Building commitment to leadership of new rector
  - o Staff review, oversight, and Policy Review including a behavioral covenant.

#### WARDEN'S REPORT

- Could 2019 been any more momentous? Adam Linton+ announced his retirement on June 21. He served us as rector for ten years, the second longest tenure in the history of the Church of the Holy Spirit. The time between his announcement and his farewell on October 27 went by in a flash and kept the wardens and vestry very busy making plans for his leave taking and the transition we have now begun.
- With the assistance and support of The Reverend Canon Kelly O'Connell, Regional Canon for Congregations in the Southern Region of the diocese, CHS hired The Reverend Debra Kissinger as our Interim Priest. She began with us on December 1. That she should begin her tenure with us on Advent I seems appropriate. She and her husband John Oaks are doing a great job acclimating to a new community and we welcome them.
- The Reverend Gail Smith, our Assisting Priest for over two years continues in that role and is focused on pastoral care so that Debra+ can direct her attention to all that a transition requires. Please contact Gail+ directly for visits, prayers, health issues, deaths and other pastoral concerns at gsmith@chsorleans.org or through the parish office at 508/255-0433. We feel very blessed to have Gail+ as part of our leadership. Because of our demographics, Pastoral Care of our church family is an enormous endeavor and simply could not happen as it does today without the dedication of a number of devoted parishioners. We are grateful for their ministry. CHS prides itself on the care it gives to those in need.
- The choir of the Church of the Holy Spirit just seems to get better and better under the leadership of Joan Kirchner and we enjoyed Sunday choral evensongs in addition to the wonderful offerings we hear every Sunday morning. We are delighted that in May she signed a five-year contract.
- CHS has a staff that works in wonderful coordination with each other and a raft of amazing volunteers that keep things running smoothly.

- Before he left, Adam+ worked hard to reconfigure the Buildings and Grounds committee. Be sure to read their report—it is remarkable how much goes into the upkeep and maintenance of this beautiful campus.
- Many of you participated in one or more of our annual fundraisers: Spring Rummage Sale, Christmas Bazaar and the Thanksgiving Weekend Antiques Show. These events are a colossal team effort and somehow, we are managing to keep them going.
- A very exciting project that is "in the works" is the re-imagining of the beloved Galley West gift shop into the Galley West Artisan's Gallery GWAG). Sue Sasso, Sharyn Laughton and Donna Tavano are spearheading this. Bob Collins has provided invaluable assistance in prepping the space for some updating. It is a wonderful example of CHS adapting to the times while preserving our history. The GWAG committee is looking into options for grant funding so the project can be done correctly. Stay tuned!
- We have said good-bye to too many beloved parishioners this last twelve months and also happily welcomed new members. Please consider bringing a friend or neighbor to one of our services or events. It is definitely the best way to grow our numbers.
- Finally, we want to express our appreciation to the CHS Nominating Committee, which has presented us with an outstanding slate of candidates for the 2020 Vestry, and the various delegate positions. We believe that if elected, this Vestry will work hand in hand with Debra+ and Gail+ during this very important time of transition for the Church of the Holy Spirit.
- Debra+ would really like to get to know all of you. Vestry members are hosting small group meetings in their homes over the next couple of months. Please sign up for one of these gettogethers on the board in the Reception Room. She and the wardens will also be sharing lots of good information related to the search in the monthly newsletter, *Together*.
- In recent years the Episcopal Church has changed their approach to the transition and search process, and it is being taken much more seriously. To that end the vestry has decided to deliberately move in a careful way to make sure we do the work we need to do to be in a healthy place for our new rector. This will take some time.
- We are all in this together and we look forward to doing the work it requires, resulting ultimately in the call of a new rector. It doesn't happen overnight! It is a process that to be successful, must be done in the mindful careful way with everyone's participation. We are excited and happy to be doing this with all of you.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT

The Treasurer's complete report is printed in the 2019 Annual Report: The following is a brief summary:

#### 2019 BUDGET REVIEW

**Revenue** of \$562,709, \$18,051 below budget

- Shortfall entirely in Pledge Income.
- Very good results in Unpledged Income, Loose Plate, Fund Raisers.
- Withdrawals from Endowments and savings, at a 5.5% rate, as planned.

**Expenses** of \$582,479, \$9,537 below budget

- Largest shortfall in Personnel costs, resulting from Rector retirement.
- Overspend of \$8,118 in grounds, elevator, and facilities maintenance.
- Resulting operating deficit was \$19,770, worse than planned by \$8,512.

# Operating Cash is negative at year end.

• This means we will borrow from Non-op cash and manage cash flow very carefully.

#### **OPPORTUNITY FOR COMMENTS**

- Brian Skea raised the question: how will the parish and leadership address the trend in declining attendance at worship services?
  - Obebra+: One of the duties of the Interim-Rector is to explore new and innovative ways attract new members. One approach being used elsewhere is moving the "church" into the community to serve and what God is calling them to do and in so doing you invite people to join your religious community. Our extensive Outreach and F4K programs are unidirectional and what we can explore are ways of making in multidirectional so that folks know of the work we are doing and hopefully attract folks to join our parish. Another way is to take visible public stands on a range of social issues and to explore ways to "brand" our Parish.

## **2021** Annual Meeting Biographies:

#### Wardens

Steven (Steve) Koehler: Will be serving a second year of his first term. Steve is a native Chicagoan who discovered Cape Cod thanks to his wife Anne and her deep family roots here. Before retiring in 2011, Steve pursued a career in accounting and financial reporting in several large and small pharmaceutical corporations for nearly forty years and is a CPA. Over those years, he also had considerable experience working with churches and non-profit organizations applying the same skills. He has served as treasurer for three different Episcopal parishes in Illinois and New Jersey. Steve also worked with the Diocese of Newark to provide financial consulting and annual audits for parishes and also served on the Commission on Ministry. At CHS he has been a member of the Finance Committee and sings in the Choir. In the Orleans community he is a Trustee and Treasurer for the Orleans Conservation Trust.

Brenda Ridgeway: Is nominated for her first two-year term as Warden. Brenda is a native New Englander, growing up in Douglas, Mass., where she attended Fairlawn Christian Reformed Church with her extended family. She moved to Eastham with her young family in 1990 to teach in the Nauset District. She taught kindergarten in Orleans for several years before moving to the middle school and finding her true calling—teaching language arts to seventh and eighth graders. Both widowed, she and Brian met in 2013, and she chose to join him in worshipping at CHS where they were married in 2014. Brenda currently serves as Co-Director of Food4Kids and as Co-Chair of Building and Grounds. She has served on the Vestry for the past three years and has served as Vestry Liaison to the Outreach and the Creative Arts Committees. (She looks forward to continuing her service as Warden for the next two years.)

#### Treasurer

Gordon (Chris) Crighton: Is **nominated** for a second one-year term. Chris is a lifelong Episcopalian and native of Massachusetts. During his military career he and his wife Diana were members of Anglican-Episcopal churches in Germany and Belgium. Chris became connected with Church of the Holy Spirit when his parents moved to Orleans in 1968 and joined the church. Chris and Diana became full-time residents here in 2015, and Chris became active in choir and the Finance Committee. Chris has served in other Episcopal parishes as junior warden with maintenance responsibilities and in several capacities relating to parish finances.

#### Clerk

John (Jack) Gentile: Is **nominated** for a fourth one-year term. Jack and his family arrived on the Cape in 2000 and joined CHS and the Episcopal Church in 2002. He was a member of the Pastoral Care ministry, a Lay Eucharistic Minister and Lay Eucharistic Visitor, and, serves on the Finance Committee. His vision for CHS is to see the church grow and attract younger families, to provide a more dynamic environment and to engage with newly retired couples to further expand our resource pool. He supports our extensive outreach program both outside the parish as well as within the CHS healing programs.

## Vestry

Nancy Boccia: Is **nominated** for a one year, completing an unexpired term. I am honored to join the Vestry and look forward to serving the Church of the Holy Spirit. I have attended various Catholic and Episcopal Churches, most recently St. Barts in New York. It has been a long time since I have felt a connection to a church community, and am grateful God led me here. Since retiring from Harvard Business School in 2013, I continue to work there as a contractor/consultant for major projects and initiatives. Prior to Harvard, I worked in the hospitality/restaurant world in New York and Boston. I am married to my wonderful husband and we have a combined family of 5 children and 7 grandchildren. I love to laugh, dance, garden, travel, cook, kayak, read and walk with my Bloodhound, Frank. As a member of the Gardening and Building & Grounds committees, I look forward to deepening my connections with the community at CHS.

J. Thompson (Tom) Dewing: Is **nominated** for a second term. Tom was raised in Belmont Massachusetts, where his family were active participants at All Saints Episcopal Church. After serving for 5 years as an officer in the Navy and with an MBA, he joined Cummins Engine for 30 years, becoming an international executive, where he met and married Sally. For 40 years he and Sally have worshipped together and participated in church life as Presbyterians, Episcopalians and in non-denominational settings in several communities around the country and internationally. They have been active participants in a number of capacities at the Church of the Holy Spirit since 2001 when they settled here. Among a number of various responsibilities, Tom has served on the Vestry, was Warden, and chaired a search committee.

<u>Douglas (Doug) Fromm</u>: Will be serving a second year of his second term. Having spent over thirty years of summers on the Cape, Doug and Dianne moved full time in 2011 and within the year found their spiritual home at the Church of the Holy Spirit. Doug spent forty-four years in parish ministry of the Reformed Church in America that hails from the reformation and dates to 1629 in this country. He has long been active in the Ecumenical Life of the Church. In the nineties decade he was a member of the dialogue between the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America and the Reformed Churches. He was an architect of the Formula of Agreement establishing full communion between these bodies. This historic dialogue ran concurrent with the dialogue between the ELCA and the Episcopal Church and the adoption of the Concordat of Agreement. A delegate to the Pontifical Council for Christian Unity in the Vatican focusing on "orders of ministry", he was part of a private audience with Pope John Paul II. He travelled to South Africa for discussions as to how the Church in the northern hemisphere could stand in solidarity with churches against the practice of apartheid. During those meetings he had chance to spend a day with Archbishop Desmond Tutu, a treasured memory. A delegate to the General Assembly of the World Council of Churches, he was one of five who joined with Episcopal Presiding Bishop Edmund Browning to meet with Palestinian leader, Yassar Arafat, at the UN in Geneva. He is honored to be nominated to serve on the Vestry of the Church of the Holy Spirit as he has a high respect for the worship and work of the parish.

<u>Katherine</u> (Kathy) Goddard: Is **nominated** for a second term. Kathy "grew up Presbyterian" in Buffalo, and became an Episcopalian after marrying Nat Goddard in 1961. They lived and worked at the

Episcopal Center in West Cornwall, CT and then lived in South Kent, CT where she was active in youth programs. They moved to Cape Cod and joined CHS in 1995 where she was on the search committee for the new rector.

John L. Harter: Will be serving a second year of his first term. John was baptized at birth in the Presbyterian religion project and raised up through the church in Sunday School, Youth Groups, Bell Choir, Choral Choir, Retreats and Work Projects He was ordained Deacon & Elder in the Presbyterian Church USA. He served as Treasurer for his congregation for ten years through two interims, as well as on many committees. He also served on the Executive Committee and as Moderator of the Presbytery of Southern New England ("bishop-level" of denomination). My faith roles have spanned teaching church school, starting a co-op nursery, altar guild, usher guild and at CHS health ministry, the annual antique show and building and grounds. Professionally, I am an RN with a range of work experiences, most recently in research and public health and volunteering for the Brain Injury Association of MA.

Johanna (Hanna) Schneider: Is **nominated** for her first two-year term. I currently live in Eastham with my mother Georgia and my daughter Beth (20) My son Ben (23) recently moved back from CO. so we have a full house. I am co-director and Lead preschool teacher of The Learning Garden Preschool in Orleans. I have lived on the cape most of my life. My parents Georgia and Kim Schneider had family homes here and I am blessed to be surrounded by Aunts, cousins and friends both old and new. As a child I attended this church with my mother and sister. As an adult I returned to hopefully offer my

children a little of what I had received as a young person. I also longed to reconnect spiritually and personally. I was welcomed immediately and became active in: Youth Group Functions, Church school, and Altar Guild.

## **Diocesan Convention and Deanery Delegates**

From 1996 until 2008, when he was rector of St. David's, South Yarmouth, Bill was a member of the Cape Cod Council of Churches, and, for two years, was President of the Council. He continues on the Council's Public Policy Committee and, along with wife Margaret Ann, will continue as CHS representatives to the Council.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT FOR 2020

## **Operating Account**

**Overview**: Our church experienced a year unlike any other in 2020. The coronavirus pandemic closed the campus and changed the way we worship together. As we would expect, it also affected the finances of the church, with the financial year bearing little resemblance to what we had expected. Our expenditures were well under budget, by \$88,708, but our revenue from normal sources also declined, and by the end of the year stood \$39,701 short of our goal. We continued to draw upon our savings and endowment funds at an annual 5.5% rate, well above the sustainable 4.0% we would prefer.

**Income**: full-year operating income was \$542,218, \$39,701 short of budget and \$21,953 below 2019. Prior year pledge was strong, but all other areas – unpledged income, loose plate, holiday giving, parish hall use, and fund raisers fell understandably short. Pledge income remained strong until late in the year, but slowed at the end as the economic impact of the pandemic made itself more strongly felt. Pledge finished short by \$17,268.

**Expenditures**: While expenditures were lower, primarily due to less use of our facilities, the total here was also lowered by \$61,163 in the form of a Paycheck Protection Program loan received in May. Had we not received that loan, expenditures would have stood at only \$27,545 under budget. At this level, 2020 expenditures were \$26,509 below 2019. The expenditures for 2020 included replacement of aging and, in some cases, inoperable heating, ventilation, and air conditioning units. Thanks to this work our physical plant enters 2021 in better shape.

#### **Non-Operating Accounts**

The Church of the Holy Spirit also maintains around 30 non-operating funds. These may be restricted (given by donors to the church for specific, temporarily or permanently restricted purposes), a category which includes our endowment funds, or designated (set aside by the Vestry for specific goals). They may be held or spent over several years, unlike the operating account which is focused on annual spending for salaries, benefits, and immediate operating needs. These funds are held in checking accounts, a money market account, and in large part at our Diocese's Diocesan Investment Trust (DIT). After difficult stretches in 2018, 2019, and earlier this year, there has been a steady recovery in their value.

Through 31 December 2020 these funds show an increase of \$216,810 (4.4%) for the year.

# **Checking and Money Market Accounts**

The church holds funds in in checking accounts and a money market account, all at the Cape Cod Five Cents Savings Bank, which include the operating balance as well as the cash portion of the non-

operational funds mentioned above. At the end of 2020 the total balance in these accounts was \$212,283, of which \$99,961 was in non-operational funds and \$112,322 was operating cash.

#### **Diocesan Investment Trust**

Our invested funds are managed by the Trustees of Donations to the Protestant Episcopal Church, generally known as the Diocesan Investment Trust (DIT). Fourteen of our non-operating funds hold positions in this investment portfolio, which are outlined in the attached DIT report. These positions are invested in two funds at the DIT, 70% in the Stock Fund and 30% in the Income Fund.

#### 2020 Outreach

The 2020 Outreach report is also attached for your reference. It lists Outreach donations from our operating budget, non-operating funds, and from our other organizations and committees, as well as the assessment from our Diocese.

The Capital Improvement fund supports repairs and additions to the property which would be eligible for depreciation in a commercial setting.

The Angelica Spiritual Living fund supports spiritual living, health and Christian formation.

The Scholarship fund provides \$1,000 scholarships to deserving graduates of Nauset Regional High School.

The Chapman Bequest supports the operating budget (75%) and the Capital Improvement Fund (25%) (Vestry 2018) The Seale Varga fund supports the library and other media.

As we come to the end of the year and look forward to 2021, we want to thank our Nominating Committee for their outstanding slate of candidates to step on to the Vestry. We know they will bring

so much to the leadership of CHS with their diverse talents and backgrounds. And we thank Kate Paradise and Meredith Perkins as they come to the end of their service on the Vestry. Your advice and counsel were always so valuable to us.

There is not much more a parish could have done in a pandemic year. The beginning of this new year feels like a time of anticipation and hope. We look forward with joy as we welcome the Rev. Joseph Robinson as our Transitional Priest-in-Charge. He brings a wealth of talent and experience to our task of preparing for a call for a new Rector, and we look forward to working with him.

#### REPORT FROM THE ASSISTING PRIEST

Before sitting down to write this report I looked back at my report from last year as Assisting Priest. I began that report with these words: "It has been a year full of changes and challenges." I went on 'I suspect there will be more changes and challenges in the year ahead." I had no idea, and no one knew what was ahead and where the year would eventually take us. The Covid-19 virus, Black Lives Matter, our political divide. As I said last year "It is how we live with and into those changes and challenges which make a difference." I believe we have done that together this past year with compassion, caring, respect for one another, and love as we share and participate in God's love. I have been reading again Presiding Bishop Michael Curry's book "Love Is The Way." He said in his introduction: "However, the future unfolds – whatever the detours, the trials, the troubles, the goal, the zenith, or the pain – we shall overcome, not for ourselves alone, but for the entire human family."

I started this year as your Assisting Priest and ended it as your Bridge Priest, and I am looking forward to being your Assisting Priest again and working with our Transitional Priest in Charge, The Reverend Joe Robinson. Joe started his new ministry with us on January 4, 2021. As your Assisting Priest I dealt with pastoral care needs in concert with our Pastoral Caregivers Committee. I assisted with services, preached and celebrated at the weekend services as well as the Tuesday healing service. I also facilitated the Sunday morning Glimpse of the Gospel.

As Ash Wednesday approached, we could see that our services would have to change with the growing spread of the coronavirus around the world, in the United States, and on the Cape. By the second week in March, we knew we needed to close the church and suspend in person services. Our then interim began twice weekly emails to the parish. The Wednesday one focused on our parish life and families, while Friday offered worship options, including meditations for adults and church school families. At that time there was no online worship. We lived through Lent and Easter in this fashion. By the end of May our Interim Priest had left, and the wardens and vestry asked if I would serve as your Bridge Priest again. All along the way we followed the protocols given to us by our diocese and the State of Massachusetts.

In mid-May I began to video my meditations, and those were added to the Friday email. The first weekend in June we did our first online service of Morning Prayer at 10:00 on Sunday. The following Tuesday we had our first online Tuesday Healing Service without communion. By then we were doing Glimpse of the Gospel on Zoom, as well as the Sunday Book Group. Zoom became our way of being in community while being separated. It has been an incredible gift to be able to see and speak to one another without masks obscuring our faces. Relationships and community grew in this space. We were able to have one in person worship on the lawn in front of Galley West for St Francis Day, Saturday Oct. 4. Physically distanced 40 people were able to attend. We also did an in person gathering on the open space across from Snow's Library with the allowed 25 people.

Later in October we had an open house organized by the Welcoming Committee and Buildings and Grounds committee. Sixty people were able to visit the grounds and tour the church to see all the work which had been done inside and outside the church including the newly renovated Sacristy. Many thanks to Vicky Hutchens, Brian and Brenda Ridgway for all your work. And a thank you to Wayne

Currey and Tony Johnson, our sextons. And thanks to all of the Garden Committee who work so hard to keep our gardens and grounds beautiful.

By November 1 we had purchased a camera and updated our sound system. Caroline Keeffe-Jones became our audio-visual person, filming our services, and working our live streaming. During Advent, and through Christmas and Epiphany, we have had online Eucharist. A huge thank you to Vicky, head of our altar guild, and the flower guild who made sure we had flowers in church on Sundays. They also beautifully decorated for Thanksgiving and Christmas. And Sharyn Laughton, Melissa Keeffe and Wayne, thank you, you made Advent and Christmas special. Our flowers have also been delivered each week to parishioners, so a special thank you to Priscilla Isner and Nancy Ludewig.

A huge thank you to Joan Kirchner our music director, organist, bell choir director, soloist, chanter and the list goes on. We have beautiful music every week because of her. Thank you for sharing this worship ministry together these last months. Thank you for your music.

The Church School of course was also suspended and will continue to be, though they have worked to find ways to stay connected. Please be sure to read their report. The committee worked with me to help create an online Nativity Pageant which I hope you all watched on our YouTube channel. Caroline filmed and edited this as well. A huge thank to Caroline and Melissa for helping to make this all possible.

As part of my ongoing pastoral connection with people I called as many as possible in our parish directory. Our Vestry also made phone calls as well. In the process we were able to find out how many of you were dealing with the isolation and separation due to Covid-19. The hardest part in this time were the wonderful parish members who died and who were unable to have services for their loved ones. When able we have had committal services in our Memorial Garden and local cemeteries. As we continue to work together, we are working on keeping in contact with those who live alone and who for whatever reason do not have access to the internet and our messages to the parish and online services.

I do not want to forget Debbi Manning who has been a stalwart in our office, continuing as she always has to keep things running there for our service bulletins, daily office needs, maintaining our connections through our phones, emails, and so much more. I cannot thank her enough. It is a long list of all of those of you who have stepped forward throughout the year to help out in some way. Thank you.

A heartfelt thank you to the Vestry, Tom Dewing, Doug Fromm, Kathy Goddard, John Harter, Priscilla Isner, Meredith Perkins, Kate Paradise, and Brenda Ridgeway. You are an incredible, dedicated group of people, and you have worked hard this past year. A thank you to our executive committee, Jack Gentile for all of your insightful support, Chris Crighton, for your hard work (it has been a hard year) as our Treasurer. Thank you both, Melissa Keeffe and Steve Koehler, our wardens. When we began these last months together, I told you that I saw what we would be doing together as a mutual ministry. We were in this together. We had no idea what this time would look like and maybe that is a good thing. There have been hard times and there have been some really good times, rewarding times. Thank you

for being there. This has not been a journey we have done alone. I have been acutely aware that God has been there all along the way even in the hardest times with the virus, with all that is happening in the world and our country. Throughout everything, two very different prayers kept coming back to me, they have kept me going. They speak to me of hope and ways forward. This work, this ministry which we all do together is something that is and will be ongoing. We are always in need of God's help, as God is in need of ours.

#### REPORT FROM THE MINISTER OF MUSIC

A highlight of the early part of the year was an Epiphany Evensong in February featuring a plainsong procession with bells and the stunning "O Nata Lux" by Thomas Tallis and other music celebrating Christ as the Light of the World. We had just begun rehearsing music for Holy Week and Easter when life as we had known it changed.

The choir has stayed a cohesive group through weekly emails featuring hymns as devotional prayers, cards and calls. The Deanery project of a virtual Lessons & Carols service offered us the opportunity to delve into that aspect of music-making, but participation was limited, so it is doubtful we will have a virtual choir at Holy Spirit. A bell quartet met for a short time between lockdowns and provided a piece for the Lessons & Carols as well as a special Thanksgiving offering. Bells will likely be the first participatory music to be resumed. During Advent Diana Landau and Vicky Hutchens took a turn at cantoring services, but for most of the pandemic we've kept the participants in the actual church to a minimum, with the organist leading the home singing.

In early days of the pandemic favorite hymns were recorded by the minister of music with accompanying background stories. To keep our hymn repertoire in our ears the music for Zoom services has used hymns for preludes and postludes as well as singing limited verses of appropriate hymns. A "Music Note" in our weekly newsletter gave us a chance to learn some of the fascinating histories of these gems of our worship.

The choir looks forward to coming together to lead our music ministry when conditions are safe for all involved.

#### **TREASURER'S REPORT FOR 2021**

## **2021 Operating Budget**

The 2021 operating budget was approved by the Vestry at its January meeting, and is included in the attached pages along with the 2020 budget and actual figures.

**Overview**: standing alone, the 2021 operating budget projects an operating deficit of \$48,372. However, when the 2020 budget surplus of \$47,692 is applied against the deficit, the bottom-line figure moves to minus \$681.

**Income**: operating income is expected to decline by \$25,766. A little over half of this is deliberate, as we take advantage of the large 2020 surplus to lower our rate of withdrawal from DIT funds to 4.9% from the 5.5% that has been the norm, in order to take some pressure off the invested funds. Most of the rest, however, reflects a troubling result of our stewardship drive, which was conducted in the face of all the social and economic effects of the pandemic and related shutdowns. In spite of many individual increases in annual pledges, the number of pledges declined to 120 from 131 in 2019, and the pledged amount declined to \$284,500 from \$300,400.

**Expenses**: operating expenses will increase by around \$70,300. Most of this will be because the actual figure for 2020 was artificially low, due to the PPP loan. Also, in 2021, we will be paying a transitional priest in charge. Repair and maintenance costs will not go up much, as so much was taken care of last year.

As I finish my first year as your treasurer, I want to thank all the people whose experience and enthusiasm for our parish have been so helpful. There's our bookkeeper, Ann Anderson; our treasurer emeritus, Steve Koehler; our database manager, Anne Koehler; our Buildings and Grounds Committee; and our Finance Committee. I would like to extend special recognition to two members of the finance committee who retired effective at the end of 2020: Jack Nixon and Bill Gardiner. Their years of experience and sound counsel are much appreciated and will be missed.

#### **BIBLICAL GARDEN**

Our church has had a special outdoor place, the Biblical Garden, first planted in 1966 and then expanded in 2000. Beside the garden there is a sign noting the scriptural passages alluding to each plant in the garden.

A small crew of parishioners (including Celia Calhoun, Vicky Hutchens and Nancy Ludewig) have shared the half-year outdoor work of this garden from April through October, through this year's pandemic. Our group has worked together (masked and 6 feet apart) to set up and plant the garden in late May and then taking turns, watering, weeding, and pruning during the growing season. We cleaned up the garden in the fall, and moved the tender potted plants to protected locations. Ginny

Clarendon, a past member of our group, has annually pruned the grapes and tended the special Rose de Provence. We are especially thankful for help from both custodians, Wayne Currey and Tony Johnson, who also watered the garden through the hot weeks of summer when they saw the need. Tending this little gem of a garden has often been a meditative and spiritually uplifting time for us, and this year, while everyone has stayed at home, it really flourished!

The management of this Biblical Garden was handed over to the Grounds Committee at the end of the season, after these 20 years. The change of use of the Galley West building may require changes in this 55-year-old garden.

# **BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS ("B & G")**

#### MISSION

"Give us a reverence for the earth as your own creation, that we may use its resources rightly in the service of others and to your honor and glory. Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer. Amen"

This past year, 2020, was a year full of activity and restoration at CHS. As the pandemic caused a shutdown of our campus early in the year, all projects moved forward, albeit at a reduced pace. New projects were identified as our property staff kept busy with restoring, rehabilitating, and renewing our aging campus.

## **Church Improvements**

In the church, the dynamic team of Wayne Currey and Tony Johnson repainted the deep red floor. They re-caulked and re-stained the kneelers, pews, and other dark woodwork. They also painted all of the doors and many of the windows on the exterior of our buildings. The hallway leading to the church offices has been painted and new flooring installed. The Sacristy has been completely updated—sinks, cabinets, counters, and flooring to provide a pleasant space.

# **Project Solar/Green Team**

The solar field panels are now installed on the hillside facing the parking lot. The next steps are waiting on the electrical inspection, installing the new Eversource meters, activation of the system, acceptance of the system by the state Smart Grid department. The revenue flow then begins. We are hopeful that on March 1<sup>st</sup>, we'll be green to go.

## **Project Galley West Restoration**

After a successful presentation to the town of Orleans Community Preservation Commission, the new CHS project of GWAG restoration and rehabilitation was approved at a phase one sum of \$132,000. This was short of the estimated quote selected; however, we received assurances from the CPC that we could reapply for 2022 funds to complete the project. We are slated to present our request on 2/4/2021 for completion money. We are targeting the fall of 2021 to open the GWAG facility in a restored condition.

To date, the foundation has been stabilized and rehabilitated. Repairs to the galley walls and roof with added insulation have been completed. New windows have been installed, the old HVAC system removed, and the Vernon Smith mural safely removed and in storage. Some demo and restoration work will continue over the next several months. After July 2021 and the beginning of a new town fiscal year, completion work will commence.

A special thank you to the team of Susan Sasso, Sharyn Laughton, and Susan Hitchcock for overseeing this project and pushing it to completion.

# **Project Rectory**

Although the rectory has stood vacant during a good portion of 2020, it has also received its share of improvements. The rectory was environmentally sanitized to ensure that there was no possibility of mold or other air-borne contaminants. The rector's office at the church underwent a similar cleaning. A new hot water heater was installed this past fall.

A new front door system was installed with a storm door. Inside, many of the walls and ceilings were repaired and/or repainted by Tony. The floors were refinished on both levels. Outside, the garden crew has paid extra attention to the lawn and foundation plantings. Shrubs have been moved around, and the entire area cleaned up.

#### **HVAC Team**

Dave Blanchet has undertaken the oversight of our furnaces and air conditioner units. He has been identifying problem units and assisting South Shore Heating and Cooling as they complete contracted annual service.

New furnaces and air conditioning systems have been purchased and installed in the east and west wings of the church and underneath the Sacristy. We have identified and catalogued all furnace and ac systems across the campus as we seek to understand what we are facing in three, five, or ten years as part of a long-range replacement plan.

We continue on our mission to preserve and maintain our physical plant.

#### Grounds

In 2020 we had over 24 individuals involved in our monthly scheduled Garden Parties. Many of our dedicated gardeners have been also busy on other days, spreading mulch, trimming, planting bulbs and engaging in general garden maintenance. In summary, over 250 hours of gardening were volunteered this year. Tony and Wayne have kept up with weekly mowing and weed whacking. ArborTech has completed annual tree trimming duties.

Ann Pike Paris has assembled a dynamic team to review our campus, plot our gardens and trees, and come up with a five-year plan to better maintain our beautiful gardens and environment. We owe all gardeners a hearty well done for their efforts in 2020, especially give restrictions imposed by COVID.

#### **Biblical Garden**

The Building and Grounds Committee wishes to thank Page McMahan for 20 years of service to our unique Biblical Garden outside Galley West. Page oversaw and planned for each year's annual plants and seeds and maintained the perennials and shrubs. She was helped by a volunteer team of parishioners (see Biblical Garden Report) to keep that tradition alive and well. As with any ministry at CHS, parishioners make up the volunteer base and at the appropriate time hand it off to others to carry on. Thank you, good and faithful servant of CHS for your commitment to, and care for, the Biblical Garden.

As we learn about our beautiful physical plant and its needed preventative care and maintenance, we are sensitive to the fact that safety, security, and the health of our congregation, staff, and visitors is paramount. In conclusion, please contact B & G members by phone or email with any concerns that you see or experience. #### **DATABASE and ONLINE GIVING**

The church database system is the repository for contact information and important dates for all Holy Spirit members. It also maintains a record of your financial contributions to the church and its ministries. Among other things the database helps us maintain a Parish Directory, generate your Giving Statements, print address labels for important mailings, answer questions about membership for the Annual Report, and remember and acknowledge birthdays and anniversaries. Please help us keep the database up-to-date!

- Check the Church Directory to be sure the contact information we have for you is correct. If
  you need a directory, contact the church office and we will either email or snail-mail a copy to
  you.
- If you move, get a new phone or email address, or take out your old land line, please contact the church office with the new information.
- If you live on the Cape only part of the year, make sure we know your address here and off-Cape and the general dates you live in each place. When we do a mailing, the database will automatically pull the right address for you.
- If you are wondering why your name is not showing up on the lists of birthdays and anniversaries, contact the church office and let us know your important dates.

This past spring we added Online Giving. With in-person assembly not possible during the COVID-19 pandemic, we wanted to make it easy for financial contributions to continue. Now you can simply go to the church website, click on the green **GIVE NOW** button and follow the instructions to make a contribution to the church by credit card or bank transfer. It can be a donation toward your annual Pledge or for a special purpose, such as flowers or a memorial gift. And everything you contribute

online connects to the church database and is included in your Giving Statement. In the first 8 months, 38 parishioners used online giving to contribute a total of \$23,872 to Holy Spirit! In December we saw online giving make a big difference in our ability to raise funds quickly for the Giving Tree: \$1,175 came from online donations in just a few days. Worried about forgetting to make your weekly or monthly contribution? Simply set up a recurring gift online and relax. You decide how much it should be, when it should start, how often it should occur, where it should go, and when it should stop.

For 2 years now we have been working to reduce our use of paper and the expense of postage. We distributed Parish Directories to most households this past fall using email. We use Constant Contact to communicate parish news. We distribute most Giving Statements via email directly from the database, which is not only efficient, but maintains confidentiality. And in their own small way, reduced use of Pledge Envelopes has had its impact, too. Our current database relies on names (e.g. from checks and memo lines on checks) instead of "envelope numbers" to accurately attribute a donation. Envelope numbers only become important if the contribution is in cash. Many of you have switched from weekly to monthly envelopes, and some have abandoned giving envelopes altogether – only 41 households requested them for 2021.

We know not everyone loves this move toward paperless communication. Do not fear! The database also helps us be responsive to those who need to/prefer to receive their information by US Mail.

# DIOCESE OF MASSACHUSETTS 235th ANNUAL CONVENTION

Held via Zoom on Saturday, November 7, 2020.

Leaders were elected to councils of the church through balloting software on our phones. The budget for 2021 was passed with little discussion; total expenditure was less than the previous year. Over \$600,000 was set aside for targeted pandemic related relief to congregations. All resolutions were voted on through the zoom program, which efficiently handled 400 responses accurately in seconds. We voted on 3 compound resolutions on Mission Strategy which are detailed below, and on resolutions from Bishop Alan Gates' Address towards the end of the session (again detailed below). The day closed with a video from the Youth working with the Diocese, showing their passion for the various topics we are all confronted with today.

# Resolutions on Three Mission Strategies, which all passed:

1. Call for Repentance and Reparations:

A challenge to deeper conversations about racism and taking meaningful action, long overdue.

- \* To explore the historic involvement in wealth derived from the forced labor of enslaved people.
- \* Prepare a tool box of resources and expertise to assist congregations and individuals. \* To report progress
- \* Recommendations for remedies, including distribution of funds in acknowledgement of, and repentance for, the sin and legacy of slavery.
- 2. Response to Bishop Curry's Declaration of a Climate Emergency:
  - \* Bishops will issue a proclamation of the climate emergency.
  - \* Encourage clergy, communities and laity to expose greed at the root of the destruction of God's creation, through preaching, education and outreach, working with the Diocesan Creation Care Justice Network, other local dioceses, and other faith and secular communities.
- 3. Call to Address the Neglect of the Seven Historically Black Churches in the Dioceses.
  - \* These churches are part of the Diocese in the Boston area.
  - \* They are a response to our Mission Strategies of Reimagining our congregations and to build relationships.
  - \* Commends the Racial Justice Commission to appoint a committee of representatives from the seven historically Black churches in the Diocese to address the neglect and unequal treatment of these churches.
  - \* The committee will work collaboratively to develop the capacity, through a discernment process of deep listening, and shared histories to reach mutual goals, and report on the same.

# Resolution in Response to Convention Address by the Rt. Rev. Alan M. Gates

- \* Resolved, that the 235th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts recognize that in 2020 brave change embraced us as a church and larger world, calling upon us to respond towards "every purpose under heaven"; and be it further
- \* Resolved, that to everything there is a season, and that COVID-19 has brought with it many challenges and much suffering, especially to all who mourn loved ones who have died, and it has also opened possibilities for hope in response to forced innovation; and be it further
- \* Resolved, that we express our deep gratitude to our bishops and diocesan staff, as well as the public health experts whom they consulted, the diocesan regathering shepherds for their spiritual and practical support during this challenging time of pandemic, and to all parishioners, lay leaders, vestry members, and clergy who have striven to meet the challenges we face; and be it further

- \* Reserved, that we affirm the new Task Force to Re-Imagine Our Common Mission in the Commonwealth with our siblings in the Diocese of Western Massachusetts, raising up the bonds of affection that we share in a spirit of collaboration to build up and deepen our relationship across diocesan lines; and be it further
- \* Resolved, that we affirm the bishop's call for the creation of the Collaborative Ministries Working Group to "gather stones together" in our diocese at this moment to seize the energy of collaborations already happening throughout various bodies in our diocese and share the good news of these collaborations; and be it further
- \* Resolved, that we affirm the reconfigured and expanded Racial Justice Commission for our shared work ahead not only to recognize and confess our own sinfulness in the personal, social, and structural dimensions of racism, but also to take up our Christian responsibility to do the gospel work of racial justice in its multiple dimensions; and be it further
- \* Resolved, that we pray to God that, called to follow the star of resurrection hope in the Way of Love, our hearts and the hearts of all people of this land are moved so that the barriers which divide us may crumble, the plywood of fear may fall, suspicions disappear, and hatreds cease; and that our divisions being healed, we may live in justice and peace through Jesus Christ our Lord (ref. Book of Common Prayer, p. 823); and be it further
- \* Resolved, that we go forth from this Convention, empowered by the Holy Spirit, to be the Church in Community, to be the Body of Christ, who--even though masked, even though physically distant, even though gathering mostly virtually, even though sad, anxious, and tiredare loved and capable, blessed to be a blessing, serving those who need us.

#### **FOOD 4 KIDS**

Works to alleviate childhood hunger on the lower/outer Cape and beyond by bringing together the Church of the Holy Spirit and local communities to provide free meals for children and teens in the summer when schools are out "Feed my lambs." (John 21:15)

Summer 2020 was totally different than any other summer due to Covid-19! Food 4 Kids jumped into action in March to aid the local schools and is currently still assisting with the administration of their

food distribution program. We saw the number of meals handed out double and the role of our many of volunteers shift from prep to distribution.

Warm up - Schools closed mid-March, and the Nauset Foods Director immediately contacted Food4Kids. From March 15 until June 28, F4K was the sponsor for four Nauset schools: Brewster, Orleans, Eastham and Wellfleet. The USDA relaxed their guidelines, and as a result, all of the towns became eligible to hand out meals. While school personnel prepared and distributed meals in a Grab and Go model, F4K provided full administrative support and interfaced with the Massachusetts Department of Education.

Our summer program ran the nine weeks from June 29 through August 30. F4K provided administration, staff, and volunteer support for the distribution of free meals at one site in each of the eight towns on the lower/outer Cape. The meals were prepared and packed at the Nauset Middle School with some help from our staff and volunteers. F4K staff and volunteers were totally responsible for the distribution of the meals. By doing so, we partnered with Monomoy Schools, Eastham Rec, Truro Rec, Provincetown Rec, South Shore Early Education, and Cape Kid Meals.

The Gap - The regular program ended in August, but schools and school meals didn't begin until mid-September. In partnership with Cape Kid Meals, F4K provided free meals and gift cards from Shaw's to families in Brewster, Orleans, and Eastham.

In the past, Food4Kids has distributed lunches and snacks or breakfast five days per week to many of their sites. This past summer, breakfasts and lunches were supplied for seven days a week. Instead of consuming the meals at designated sites, they were distributed in a grab-and-go model, requiring parents to pick up meals at a designated spot in each town each weekday.

As a result, in 2020, F4K served more children who truly needed free meals. F4K has continued its sponsorship of the Nauset Schools and Cape Cod Tech and will continue through June 2021. As long as USDA funding holds, there are no eligibility requirements to receive meals, and grab-and-go is permitted.

# **Fun Facts from this Past Summer**

- Total substantial meals served during 11 weeks of summer: 54,194
- Served 300 525 children/day; varied a lot by day, by site
- Breakfast AND lunch 7 days each week for 9 continuous weeks
- Reached more teens
- 150+ volunteers answered our pleas for assistance; 102 were new to F4K
- 27 drivers made the Brewster run over the course of the summer
- Volunteers logged about 2000 hours and 2000 miles

# **GALLEY WEST ARTISAN GALLERY (GWAG)**

Rome was not built in a day and neither will the Galley West Art Gallery. After a long grant approval process, in June 2020, the Town of Orleans approved our CPC Grant request to preserve and restore the historic Galley West buildings. However, due to a funding shortfall for all the grants submitted to the town, our request was reduced by about \$50,000 with the proviso we could reapply this year for the balance needed to complete the restoration. Once

we go through the second grant review and town approval process, the balance of our funds will be available July 1, 2021 and the restoration completed after that.

We have hired JC Donald Company of Orleans to do the restoration. Since work needs to follow funding availability, the full restoration will not be completed until summer of 2021. The planned Gallery Grand Opening is scheduled for Saturday October 16, 2021. Thank you to Brian and Brenda Ridgeway and the CHS B&G team for their oversight of this complicated grant request and restoration process.

This year, Susan Hitchcock has joined Sue Sasso and Sharyn Laughton on the GWAG Leadership team. They have been meeting weekly since September to develop the detailed work plan required to operate a Community Art Gallery. We already have 18 CHS artists who have expressed an interest in being GWAG members. All CHS member artists are encouraged to submit an application to join. If you are interested, please contact Sue Sasso. Press releases in local papers announcing the new gallery are planned and will include an invitation to artists in the eight Lower and Outer Cape towns to join.

We are very excited that our vision of continuing the legacy of Florence Kimball and Vernon Smith using the Galley West as an art center.

### **HABITAT for HUMANITY**

The Vestry voted unanimously in June to take \$50,000 from our savings and endowment funds to sponsor the next Habitat house build in Orleans. This gift will make the Church of the Holy Spirit the sponsor of the build. Furthermore, the Vestry voted unanimously to designate the \$50,000 gift in honor of Gilbert Merritt and Nat Goddard, two long time active members of The Church of the Holy Spirit who both worked as key partners with Habitat for Humanity, Cape Cod.

Most of us are aware of the worldwide housing project called Habitat for Humanity and many of us support it with our gifts. It builds homes for families using volunteer laborers and the sweat equity of time by the designated family to build a house from the ground up. It is a combined effort toward the goal of home ownership by a family that would not otherwise be able to own a home. CHS has been represented by volunteers who have given countless hours to building homes on the Cape and Orleans, none more than Gilbert Merritt and Nat Goddard.

As stewards of the CHS heritage we continue to live out the ideals and mission of prior generations who were bold in their initiatives. This decision continues the recognition of community needs and responds, once again, "in a renewed effort to demonstrate Christian concerns in the immediate community."

There is a boldness about the Church of the Holy Spirit that makes it stand out as a Parish. Its genesis was during the Great Depression of widespread unemployment and bank failures, a time of uncertainty. Undeterred, a band of Orleans folks were determined to organize a church.

On Sunday, June 4, 1933, the Church of the Holy Spirit held it first service of Morning Prayer in the spirit of Hope and Faith for better days to come. Called a "maverick church" it was said to be "off to a brave start".

The new church was always aware of the needs of fellow Cape Codders and adopted a missional way of life that responded to the needs. From its beginning, there was DNA in the parish to "demonstrate Christian concerns to the immediate community".

In the nineteen-sixties a Head Start Program was started to "teach pre-schoolers from low income families". The facilities at 204 Monument Road have been made available to Alcoholics Anonymous groups for many years. Outreach to the Orleans community was at the heart of the parish. Over the years other programs and projects were inaugurated in response to community needs.

It was in 1969 that the congregation focused its attention on the need for low income housing "for the many isolated, widowed, and single elderly individuals in the mid-Cape area." In bold action, the Vestry created a corporation and sought to bring churches together in securing federal funds to build affordable housing in Orleans.

"A parishioner provided the leadership, and the Vestry voted funds -- \$1,000 to help finance preliminary work and later, \$2,600 as a loan to secure an option on land. The fruit of this parish initiative is the 60 unit Tonset Woods development. The Rector was also influential in drafting the Town Meeting article for the organization of the Orleans Housing Authority" that continues today and has and still has members of CHS serve on the Board. From its beginnings the Church of the Holy Spirit has taken bold actions with affordable housing in its DNA.

Now 87 years later CHS finds itself in another challenging time of a worldwide pandemic with accompanying uncertainty. For the first time in its history the sanctuary doors are closed and the congregation is dispersed and locked in their homes.

Unemployment is again rampant, challenging the livelihoods of families and individuals on the Cape and in the town of Orleans. Once again the need for affordable housing is challenging.

Aware of the need for affordable housing and in recognition of the gifts of volunteer time and labor that these two CHS "saints", Gilbert and Nat, provided Habitat, the Vestry decided to once again be bold and take action and address housing needs for a family in Orleans. The Vestry was guided by the legacy of bold action, by the Church of the Holy Spirit, in response to community needs.

# **NAUSET INTERFAITH ASSOCIATION ("NIA")**

The Nauset Interfaith Association is a 501c3 non-profit association of clergy and lay leaders from 22 congregations in the eight towns of the lower and outer cape and the Islamic Society of Cape Cod located in Hyannis. Holy Spirit was one of the founding members in 2001. Our mission is threefold: To deepen our mutual understanding of each faith tradition; provide mutual support and encouragement to each other; and to work together for the common good of our wider community, especially standing with the poor, oppressed and the marginalized.

The Board of Directors for NIA meets monthly (online at present until we are able to take turns hosting in our congregations) on the second Thursday of the month from 10 am to 11:30 am. We usually have 25 to 30 people present! NIA sponsors several events each year for Thanksgiving, Martin Luther King birthday, Good Friday, Indigenous Peoples Day and the holocaust memorial and other special events with our action teams. We also sponsor an annual Olive Branch Award to a cape resident and a Peace Essay Contest for high school youth. We also take positions on important ethical issues from time to time such as human rights and environmental justice.

During the summer of 2020 I retired as president of NIA after serving in the post since 2009. During the 2020-2021 school year I am working with The Rev. Charles Nichols of St. Mary of the Harbor Episcopal Church and Madalyn Hillis-Dineen of St. Joan of Arc Roman Catholic Church who are the new co-presidents of NIA. I remain treasurer of NIA. I am grateful for all those from CHS who are members of one of our action teams and for those serving on the Board of Directors.

NIA collaborates with or supports other community and justice-oriented groups such as the NAACP, Cape Cod Community College, Mashpee Wampanoag Tribe, Annunciation House, Sustainable Practices, National Religious Coalition Against Torture, Pause-A-While Inc., Homeless Prevention Council, Family Diversity Project, Zion Union Heritage Museum, Cape Cod Voices and Amazing Grace Summer Camp for the children of inmates.

Over the past 10 years NIA has experienced substantial growth and now has 4 action teams with a 5<sup>th</sup> forming during 2021. They are:

MLK Action Team, organized in 2015 which just completed a highly successful online MLK Day Breakfast event focused on the voices of young people on Cape Cod, especially those of color. The Team has developed four task forces working on: education (conference for Cape Cod teachers in July on curriculum revision especially on history and race), police (several police chiefs approached us to start a group to meet with them on a regular basis), advocacy (a group encouraging citizen participating in elections and state policies relating to racism, incarceration and economic inequalities). YOUTH OUTREACH HOSPITALITY Action Team (YOH!) also established in 2015, focuses on the helping at risk or homeless teenagers and young adults on Cape Cod, especially LGBTQ youth. The team works with counselors at our three local regional high schools who are members of YOH as well as the Homeless Prevention Council, youth worker. This year we have added a collaboration with a group supporting transgender youth. Scholarships and the offer of friendship are given for up to 4 years to a student from each of the 3 regional schools. REFUGEE SUPPORT Action Team, established in 2016, in response to the asylum and refugee crisis in the Middle East, and Africa. The team advocates for a humane and caring immigration policy in the USA and support for area refugees and asylum residents. We are hoping to restore a summer weekends at the Cape program for urban immigrants and refugees in 2021 if Covid-19 has been brought under control. We administer two emergency help funds for two refugee families, one on the Cape and one a former summer weekend on the Cape family, whose only parent died of Covid-19. Chair: The Rev. ### **OUTREACH COMMITTEE**

In the year of Covid our usual meetings and plans changed. We began meeting on Zoom right away as the CHS campus closed and we continued contacts with our charitable agencies. Most of them continued as best they could. Needs increased and we tried to keep up. When we couldn't receive most of our annual questionnaire requests for agency financial and other information, we decided to pay the amounts we sent the previous year. Additional funds were paid to those most in need. By summer most everyone was settled into routine. Fortunately, the Cape resisted most spikes in spite of the summer tourist season and people staying longer in their normally seasonal homes.

The Church of the Holy Spirit has always taken outreach to others as a prime objective of our volunteerism as well as our financial donations. The agencies we work with are carefully screened as to their mission, viability and need.

This committee has the responsibility for making grants from the Outreach line item in the Parish Budget, from Badger Fund income and from funds raised by the First Fruits committee and the Heed Fund. Note that bequests from former committee members Grace Bell and Freddie Fitzgerald also provided money to Outreach this year.

We take this responsibility seriously. Our members are liaisons to the agencies we support and keep the committee aware of their needs and activities. We review questionnaire responses and financials annually from our agencies. Meetings, which are always open to the parish, are held the first Thursday of every month at 1:30 p.m. in the Fireplace Room. Please contact any of our committee members if you have suggestions or questions.

#### SUPPORT ON CAPE COD

Agencies that we partner with on the Cape include:

AIDS SUPPORT GROUP of CAPE COD. Our Parish AIDS Ministry works closely with this group that provides a variety of services to HIV/AIDS patients and their families. Much of their work now is providing help for the opioid crisis on the Cape.

AMAZING GRACE. This agency provides a one-week camping experience to Cape children of incarcerated parents. St Mary's Barnstable and the YMCA Camp Burgess in Sandwich manage the program. This camp did not open in 2020.

BIG BROTHERS/BIG SISTERS. This organization matches children 8-12 who need an adult role model, either a girl/woman or a boy/man relationship, when one is missing from the family. The process to be approved, as "Big" or a "Little" is a long one but the rewards can be excellent for both child and adult. There are CHS parishioners who are or who have been "Bigs".

CAPE ABILITIES is a sheltered workshop allowing physically or mentally challenged people to help support themselves by working in a friendly, supportive environment.

CAPE COD COUNCIL OF CHURCHES is a consortium of 67 churches Cape wide working together to provide a variety of resources to people in need in our communities. The Hands of Hope Outreach Center provides cash assistance, clothing, and Christmas gifts for families in need in the mid-Cape area. A Baby Center provides pregnant women and mothers with children less than one year old with counseling and necessities such as food, clothing, diapers and furniture.

The Council sponsors a variety of other programs, including the Covenant to Care for Foster Families, Street Outreach, Children and Youth Task Force and chaplains in local hospitals and prisons. Our delegates represent the parish at the Council's annual meeting and volunteers work at the Hands of Hope Outreach Center weekly. The toys brought to our Epiphany toy drive are donated to the service center for distribution the following year.

CHAMP HOUSE in Hyannis provides supportive housing in a family environment for homeless young adults (age 17 to 24), including those suffering from mental illness or substance abuse problems.

FOOD FOR KIDS is a ministry of CHS in partnership with the US Department of Agriculture. During the past seven summers, F4K has provided nutritional lunches and snacks for needy children to make up for the absence of school lunches during summer months.

Due to COVID-19, in 2020, F4K also partnered with the Nauset and Monomoy Schools to provide breakfast and lunch to local families for seven days each week. Meals were prepared and packed at the Nauset Middle School in Orleans and then distributed to a school in each of the eight towns on the Lower/Outer Cape. Parents and guardians received the meals in a "grab and go" model each weekday. Children's books were also distributed at each site. Fewer volunteers were needed this past summer to prepare and pack the meals, but many more were needed on the distribution end. Volunteer drivers delivered the meals to each school. Other volunteers assisted handing out the meals as families arrived to request them from late June into September. F4K is thankful for their faithful volunteers as well as others who generously donated money.

FRIENDS OF PRISONERS provide a prison ministry in the Barnstable House of Corrections and operates a halfway house for released prisoners who do not have family or other support in the area. Unfortunately, FOP was forced to close this year.

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY builds homes with volunteer labor, which are sold at low cost with interest-free mortgages to first-time homebuyers who otherwise could not afford a home. Mortgage payments are recycled to build more homes. CHS parishioners have been actively involved with building area homes. Due to the building slowdown this year and the CHS decision to donate the cost of a future home, it was decided not to make our usual contribution to Habitat.

HOMELESS NOT HOPELESS. Offers two homes for men and two for women at an affordable rate while they become independent by finding jobs and managing their responsibilities.

HOMELESS PREVENTION COUNCIL's main objective is to keep people in their homes in times of financial and emotional stress. This agency is a major recipient of our church outreach funds. The council works with other advocacy groups, town agencies and churches to help people access money, food, furniture, transportation, housing and other needs. The Church of the Holy Spirit helped establish the Council in 1990 and supports it financially and with volunteers.

HOSPITALITY HOMES provide accommodations in private homes, either free or at low cost, for families who wish to be near family members or friends in Boston hospitals.

INDEPENDENCE HOUSE provides emergency help and continuing support for women who are victims of abuse or sexual assault. Services include crisis intervention, emergency safe shelter, counseling, court advocacy and support for rape and incest victims.

LATHAM CENTERS, the Latham School began in 1970 as a therapeutic residential program for girls aged 8 – 22 who had traumatic backgrounds and behavioral issues. Since then, Latham has evolved into a coed program for children and adults with complex special needs, including PTSD, Reactive Attachment Disorder, Autism, Depression, Anxiety, Learning Disabilities, and Prader-Willi Syndrome. PWS is a genetic disorder that results in lifelong cognitive limitations, behavioral issues, and insatiable appetite. Without food-security and the proper treatment, PWS is a life-threatening condition. Latham is the only program in the country that meets the complex needs of children, youth and adults with PWS.

LOWER CAPE OUTREACH COUNCIL is also a major recipient of our church funds. It provides emergency assistance to families and individuals in need on the Lower Cape. It supplies nine food pantries, distributes food baskets to over 900 households at Thanksgiving and Christmas, runs quarterly food distributions, Santa's Shop (where clients can pick out toys for their children), provides free clothing at Katy's Korner and meets household emergencies with payments for electricity, heat, medicine, rent/mortgage, insurance or transportation. They also have an additional education fund which can help adults with books or tuition payments. Many LCOC volunteers are members of our parish. In addition to financial support from the Outreach Committee, the Holy Spirit congregation contributes generously to the LCOC food pantries.

NAUSET TOGETHER WE CAN. This agency is five days a week after school program for Orleans Middle School children. It provides monthly/bimonthly evening activities for middle and high school students.

ORLEANS ELEMENTARY SUMMER SCHOOL PROGRAM: The goal of the Orleans After School Program is to provide a safe, nurturing, creative and fun environment for children of working parents afterschool. We believe in offering a variety of activities to respond to varying ages and developmental levels, in order to correlate to the needs of our students. This program did not continue this year.

The Outreach Committee provides a camp scholarship for a needy child, whose parent(s) work, during the summer months. This program did not continue this year.

SAFE HARBOR provides shelter and support services to women and their children who have become homeless due to domestic violence. They acquired the Friends of Prisoners home this year.

UP WITH KIDS is an organization that helps chronically ill children.

#### WORLDWIDE OUTREACH

AMERICARES. Donation was not made this year to support catastrophe relief efforts. We have worked successfully with this agency because of their proven track record of efficiently getting aid promptly to people wherever needed.

ENDOPUTO is a primary school program in Tanzania building schools to provide clean water and education in the bush for several hundred children K-8, operating without government assistance. The first class has graduated and now most of the class is enrolled in High School. Our donations have helped in this process as we have watched in the building of the school, hiring teachers, outfitting the students, supplying books and other materials. Our parishioner Cheryl Kyle has provided critical support for this successful program for many years.

#### **PARISH OFFICE**

The office hours for 2020 had been established as Monday through Thursday, 10:00 am to 12:30 pm. These hours were working exceedingly well until March 13. On this date, the CHS campus was completely closed due to COVID-19. Space Usage was suspended indefinitely (except for: AA, Al anon, and the American Red Cross) and after much consideration, the office hours were pared back to three days a week. Some office procedures that were instituted as a result of the pandemic were: 1. Face mask, social distancing, hand sanitizing, and wiping down surfaces. 2. A COVID-19 contact tracing book was created. All persons entering the office were required to sign in with their name, date, and phone number. 3. A mailbox was installed by the office door to be used as a "drop box" to facilitate the easy transfer of materials to and from parishioners and the office. In spite of the necessary changes during the year, instituted by the Governor of Massachusetts for COVID safety, the business of the CHS office continued as usual.

Arline Consiglio was instrumental in keeping any Space Usage issues and our CHS calendar up to date. Wayne Currey and Tony Johnson worked nonstop with hands on repairs and projects throughout the campus and rectory. Sue Sasso was essential in creating the "Worship Weekly" and "Being Together- Apart" newsletters to keep all of the parishioners informed and feeling connected. Ann Anderson and Chris Crighton have kept all billing and financial matters current. Anne Koehler (with Celia Calhoun) has efficiently maintained our Data Base. Gail+ Smith's leadership and example was beyond exceptional during this trying time.

To all of you I want to extend my deepest gratitude. Without your constant support, smiles, and virtual hugs, this job would not be as enjoyable and rewarding.

### **PASTORAL CARE MINISTRY**

Pastoral Care is the responsibility of the clergy: for 2020 the clergy was our Bridge Priest, The Reverend Gail Smith. The Pastoral Caregivers Group reports to Gail+, giving her administrative support, and trying to take over much of the follow-up visiting and calling so that she is free to handle emergencies. When the pandemic hit, and the Church was closed and visiting was banned, including clergy visits, we had to re-think our ministry together. Gail+ called almost every family in the parish, to get to know people better and to understand their situations. She then called us together as a group, meeting weekly, initially, to support us and to encourage us in doing what we could to reach out to people.

Gail+ has worked diligently to be in touch with people in crisis, whether temporary or permanent. We have tried to continue to reach out to those in need, while also trying to manage our own changed lives. We have also reached out to people living alone (through a program with vestry members), sent Thanksgiving cards to those in need, and Christmas cards to all parish members.

There are now 5 Pastoral Caregivers in the group: Peter Blank, Margaret Anne Heuss, Vicky Hutchens, Sandy Marshall and Elizabeth Merritt. Peter Blank specializes in contacting all the people we know about who are in Nursing Homes or Assisted Living accommodation in the area; Margaret Anne Heuss (parish nurse) follows up with people who have been hospitalized or sent to a nursing homes; Sandy Marshall organizes the prayer shawls (which we have not been able to give out during the pandemic) and the Eucharistic Visitor program (which sadly ceased when the pandemic hit); and Elizabeth Merritt sends cards to people with help from Jean Collins and Jan Roberts. All of them also reach out to parishioners by phone and I thank you all so much for participating in this important ministry. I would also like to thank our Vestry Liaison, Priscilla Isner, for attending every meeting and participating in everything we did.

Dilys Smith manages the Living with Loss program, which ceased during the pandemic, and she continues to manage the Birthday Card ministry and her personal ministry of keeping in touch with many people. Thank you, Dilys.

The Intercessors Prayer List is sent to a group of about 20 people in the Parish, who agreed to pray for those on the list and to guard the information with discretion. The list of those in need of prayer is managed by the Pastoral Care Coordinator. Please send any requests for prayer to intercessors@chsorleans.org or contact the clergy.

If anyone you know in the parish has gone to a hospital or nursing home, or who has suffered any major loss or life changing circumstance please send an email to the email ID below:

All we can do during this pandemic is to pray, call by phone and send cards. The worst consequence of the pandemic is that we cannot have funerals. Our hearts go out to those of you who are suffering from this painful consequence.
