# MINUTES OF THE 2025 ANNUAL MEETING

Held on FEBRUARY 2, 2025

(in person and on Zoom)

The Church of the Holy Spirit (Episcopal)

Orleans, Massachusetts

**Welcome, Warrant and Invocation:** Priscilla Isner, Warden, welcomed everyone.

Registrars: Cris Harter, Donna Bailey, Brenda Husson, and Cynthia Murray, with Nancy Boccia for Zoom attendees. The Rev. Patrick Ward gave the Invocation. Priscilla read the Warrant and called for the Quorum. Cris Harter reported 115 being in person and on Zoom.

**Quorum and Appointment of Tellers:** Priscilla Isner called the meeting to order and declared the Annual Meeting in Session and appointed Tellers: Ike Cole, Tom Faulkner and Hannah Schneider. The clerk appointed for the meeting was Dianne Fromm.

**Minutes of the 2024 Annual Meeting:** Dianne Fromm called for a motion to receive and approve the Minutes of the Annual Meeting held January 28, 2024. It was proposed by Dilys Smith, seconded by Cris Harter, all approved.

## Reports:

The following gave their reports:

John Harter: Treasurer's report for 2024 and the budget for 2025.

Celia Calhoun: Report of the Wardens

Patrick C. Ward: Report of the Rector

(All reports are included in the Annual Report on the church website.)

Chip Bechtold proposed a motion to receive the Fiscal Year 2025 Budget as adopted by the Vestry, seconded by Rick Paris, and the motion passed.

Phil Suraci proposed a motion to receive the reports that were presented in the annual report, seconded by Chip Bechtold, and the motion was passed.

**By-Laws Task Force Report:** Sarah Gregory reported on several changes in the by-laws, bringing the church into compliance with current Diocesan norms. She asked for questions. There being none, Celia Calhoun moved that the new by-laws be adopted. John Harter moved the motion. Rick Paris seconded. The vote was unanimous in person and on Zoom and the by-laws are adopted.

**Nominating Committee Report:** As Chair of the Nominating Committee, Norman Stubbendick thanked the additional committee members: Jamie Thompson, Ann Pike-Paris, Brian Skea, Donna Tavano, and Rev. Dilys Smith so moved, Bob Hubby seconded, the motion passed and the Clerk cast her vote.

**Departure of outgoing Vestry members:** Patrick Ward offered a prayer along with thanks and gifts to Ann Pike-Paris and Nancy Boccia.

**Installation of new Vestry members and Representatives to the Diocese:** Patrick Ward offered a prayer at the installation of Priscilla Isner, John Harter, Dianne Fromm, Carol Baffi-Dugan, William Mason, Jen Marlin, and Elizabeth Suraci, Brenda Ridgeway and Susan Sasso.

### Opportunities for comments:

Rick Paris asked about our status as a sanctuary for immigrants and possible response to ICE, should a visit occur. Patrick Ward responded that, in spite of personal opinions and our belief in the dignity of all people, we have never been designated as a sanctuary church. The Vestry would need to deliberate and decide on a new policy. Dilys Smith noted the many contributions of the Choir. Patrick Ward offered thanks.

## TREASURER'S REPORT FOR CHURCH YEAR 2025

### *Operating Account*

We have an excess of Income over Expenses of \$ 64.3K for the Total Year 2025 which will **replenish our savings** as part of our unrestricted reserves available for use in our future together.

**Income:** Pledge Income of \$411K came in at 110% of budget (\$375K), meaning we had some new pledgers throughout 2025 and many regular pledgers most generously paid CHS in 2025 MORE than they had pledged. Unpledged, Loose Plate and Holiday Giving income of almost \$63K were also slightly over budget. Therefore, Total Parish Giving of \$479K was over budget by 10%.

Fund Raising Events continued to excel in 2025 as they did in 2024 contributing \$34K to Income and another \$3.8K distributed as Outreach pursuant to Vestry directive to Tithe CHS Events 10% for outreach. The Solar Array income is under budget (by \$3K) due solely to the slowness of income generators to pay us.

We did not pay an assisting priest in 2025. We had Budgeted to draw \$30K from funds received from the IRS for retaining employees during Covid to underwrite this cost; we drew nothing from the IRS Employee Retention Fund in 2025 and will apply these saved funds in 2026.

To balance our 2025 Budget expenses, we drew 5.5% of our savings supporting operations (a portion of our funds invested at the DIT), which is a lower rate than we have drawn in recent years. Because CHS will return \$64.3K to our invested savings (see 1<sup>st</sup> paragraph), we overdrew what we needed to attain a balanced budget; The Net effect of this Return to Savings is that CHS actually USED only **4%** from our invested savings in the DIT in 2025 to support operations.

Total Operating Income of \$783.5K finishes the year at 101% of Budget.

**Expenses:** We did not pay an assisting priest in 2025 as we had budgeted. We had provided a stipend of \$50K for 6 months of a ¾ time priest, together with other costs for pension, insurances, etc. for a total budgeted cost of \$65K.

Removing the assisting priest from the 2025 budget:

Total 2025 Expense Budget:	\$788.5
Assisting priest budget 2025:	- <u>65.0</u>

This Recast 2025 Expense Budget (\$723.5) compares favorably with CHS Actual 2025 Expenses of \$729.1 (only \$5.6K over Recast Budget without priest expense.).

Unexpected expenses were incurred 1) to re-shingle the south side of the Rectory (due to normal aging) to prevent future damage, and 2) for maintenance on the CHS alarm system. We continue to incur high expenses for the repair, maintenance and replacement of various parts of our substantial and aging campus, and we have a comprehensive plan in hand prepared by our Property Committee.

In 2023 CHS adjusted staff and independent contractor compensation upward to more properly reflect current living wages for each position. In CHS gave year-end bonuses to staff. Bonuses were not paid at year end 2025. Having had a good year financially is much the result of our caring staff and we determined that staff salaries were still a bit low overall for Cape living reality. Staff received an 8% raise for 2026 (3% cost of living adjustment for inflation AND a 5% raise), with gratitude.

Patrick was given a bonus at year end 2025, together with a cost-of-living adjustment and a raise.

Please note that Outreach Expense of \$40K included in the Operating Budget is but a piece of CHS Outreach Giving – please see “Outreach Report” below for details of ALL Outreach from CHS.

**Fund for the Future:** After serious deliberation, discussion and discernment, CHS Vestry decided to ask the congregation for additional funds in a modified capital campaign. Major and immediate future expenses included underwriting the cost of a full-time 2<sup>nd</sup> priest (current Annual Pledge income cannot fully support), connecting to the sewer, painting the entire interior of the Parish Hall (not painted since building at the turn of the century), and other capital and lifestyle improvements TOGETHER WITH Adding to our Unrestricted Savings.

Hiring Episcopal priest and professional fundraiser Brain Raiche, we determined that we could reasonably expect to raise about \$750K (based on current annual pledge levels), with a Challenge Goal of One Million Dollars. By astounding commitments from so many, our congregation blew past the challenge goal to Pledge \$1,122K. (\$548K has been received to date.). WOW! Thank you all.

### ***Non-Operating Accounts***

The Church of the Holy Spirit maintains 30 non-operating funds. These may be:

- Restricted (given by donors to the church for specific, temporarily or permanently restricted purposes), a category which includes our endowment funds.
- Designated (set aside by the Vestry for specific goals).
- 2 New Funds were added in 2025:
  - **Florence Kimball Fund** for unrestricted gifts
  - **Fund for the Future** for purposes described including underwriting of Associate Rector cost for 3 years, sewer connection, capital improvements and addition to our unrestricted savings

They may be held or spent over several years, unlike the operating account which is focused on annual spending for salaries, benefits, and immediate operating needs. These funds are held in checking accounts, a money market account, and in large part at our Diocese's Diocesan Investment Trust (see below)

### ***Checking and Money Market Accounts***

The church holds funds in checking accounts and a money market account, all at the Cape Cod Five Cents Savings Bank, which include the operating balance as well as the cash portion of the non-operational funds mentioned above. At the end of 2025 the total balance in these accounts was \$149,277.

### ***Diocesan Investment Trust***

Our invested funds are managed by the **Trustees of Donations to the Protestant Episcopal Church**, generally known as the Diocesan Investment Trust (DIT). Fifteen of our non-operating funds hold positions in this investment portfolio, which are outlined in the attached DIT report. These positions are invested in two funds at the DIT, with goals of 65% in the Stock Fund and 35% in the Income Fund.

Our investments in the Diocesan Investment Trust (DIT) finished strong, with a gain of over 6 percent for the year AFTER our draw of 5.5% to support Operations for 2025 and \$54K drawn principally for capital improvements and web site development. CHS supporters also paid almost \$440K on their Fund for the Future pledges. Even when our substantial withdrawals are factored in, our portfolio supporting operations still grew by over \$332,000.

The 12/31/25 DIT balance of **Savings supporting Operations** is **\$5,055K**- It has grown 19% AFTER EXPENSES over the last 3 years.

**Total Savings on deposit** at 12/31/25 in the DIT: **\$6,462K**. See "CHS Portfolio (DIT Report)" following.

### ***2025 Outreach***

The 2025 Outreach report is also attached for your reference (see p. 48). It lists Outreach donations from our operating budget, non-operating funds, and from our other organizations and committees.

### ***Florence Kimball Society and Fund established***

In gratitude for all those who remember The Church of the Holy Spirit financially beyond their annual pledges, we established The Florence Kimball Society and Fund. Gifts from parishioners' planned giving and other gifts will be added to the already great generosity shared from previous generations of givers. Funds will be managed by the **Trustees of Donations to the Protestant Episcopal Church (DIT)**.

### ***Conclusion***

This great financial performance is driven by long time congregants pledging anew and new people who come through our doors and stay because they are well greeted. Our Bazaar, Rummage Sale and Antiques sales continued in excellence of quality of product and Event Experience as well as income and provide important open-door experiences attracting new members and great community building events for members. The principal explanation, however, is that Patrick agreed to forestall hiring an assisting priest for 3 years. We planned to hire in 2025 but did not – CHS has hired a new Associate Rector who will start at CHS in March 2026; and that new hire is underwritten by the Fund for the Future.

2026 Pledges in hand total 149 –Totaling over \$420K. 72 Increased pledges / 19 New Pledges.

We are blessed and continue as financially responsible stewards of the many generous gifts given for the greater glory of God.

## OPERATING BUDGET FOR 2026

The 2026 Operating Budget was approved by Vestry at its January meeting, and is presented, together with 2025 Actual and Budget figures below.

**Overview:** We have hired a full time Associate Rector to work with Patrick: The Rev. Nancy Hagner. She will start at CHS in March 2026. We are also in the process of purchasing a 2<sup>nd</sup> rectory (a local condominium) for Nancy to use while at CHS and will close in February 2026. Our current income from customary annual sources would be insufficient to provide these additions to our life, so we will draw from other sources while retaining a reasonable DIT Draw rate.

**Income:** Total Operating Income budgeted for 2026 is \$920.5K. In addition to regular income sources, CHS will draw:

- \$100K from Fund for the Future (less than full cost of Associate
- \$. 32.5K from IRS Covid Employee Retention Fund
- \$248K from our invested savings in DIT (5.4% withdrawal)

While we maintain a reasonable withdrawal rate from DIT (5.4%), by using IRS/ERC monies Vestry dedicated to onboarding a new Associate Rector, we are able to draw less than 100% of the Total cost of the priest from Fund for the Future reserves. Total cost to CHS of the new Associate Rector: \$180K annually – 10 months 2026 = \$150K.

Excluding the \$100,000 Fund for the Future draw, Total Income budgeted is 7% over 2025.

Annual Pledge commitments for 2026 total \$420.3, 17% Higher than 2025 (2025 Budget: \$375K; 2025 Actual: \$411K), with the same number of pledgers: 150. 19 families pledged for 2026 who have not pledged before, and 71 families increased their annual pledges. However, we lost a few to moves, deaths and aging out of annual pledging.

**Expense:** The major additional expense for 2026 will be a 2<sup>nd</sup> priest, which includes the cost of housing. We are in process of purchasing a condo which will have a mortgage. Our annual NET carrying cost for the condo is expected to be less than the rental cost of a comparable living space. At the end of 3 or more years, CHS will own an appreciated (we hope) asset – the condo. If we paid rent for Nancy, or paid her more as a housing allowance, that money would be spent – instead we'll still own a condo with value in the end.

Other expense is generally in line with 2025 adjusted slightly up for inflation.

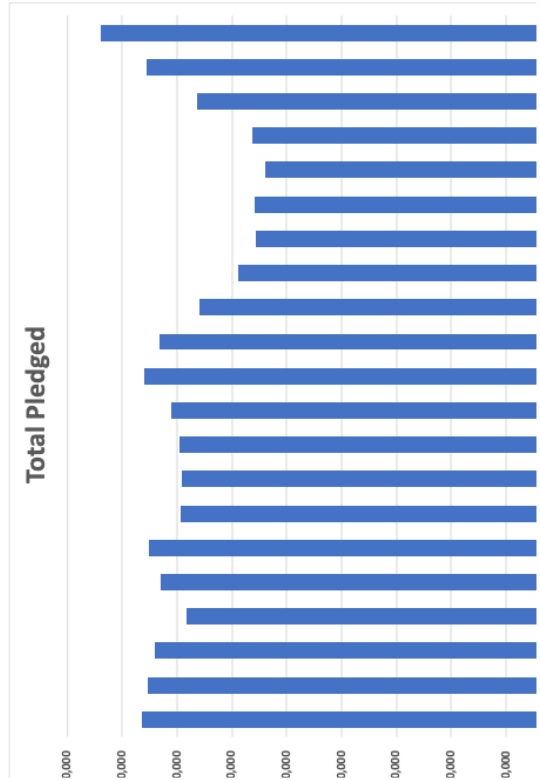
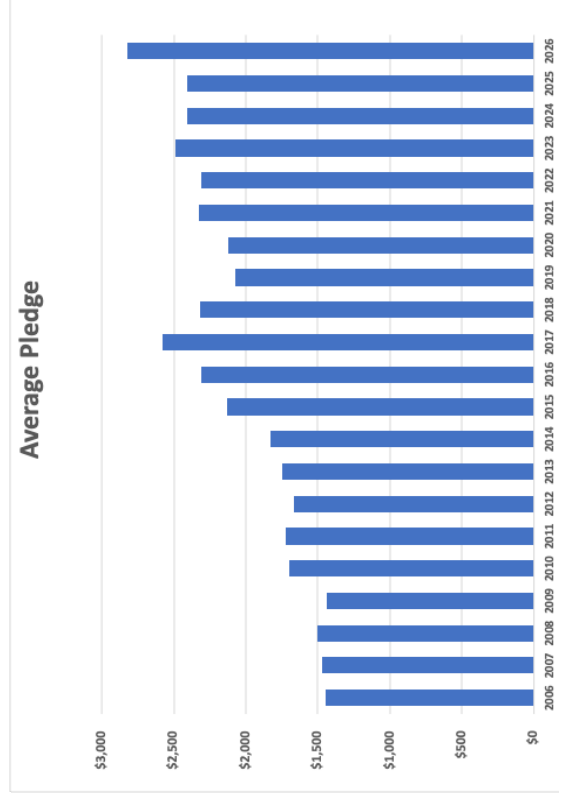
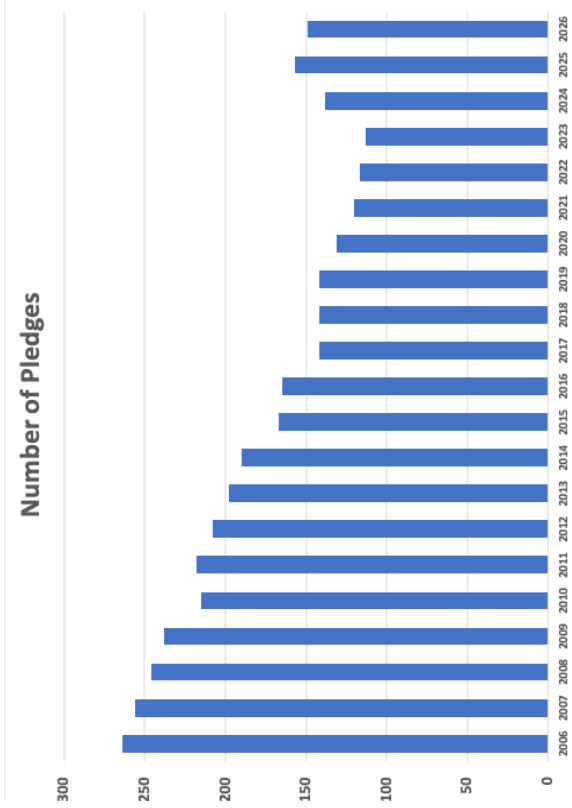

The Badger/Morgan/Heed Fund supports Outreach.

## REPORT FROM THE RECTOR

*“Beloved Community.”*

As I complete my third year with you, I’ve heard that term repeated by a number of parishioners as a descriptor either of their experience in our church or of the vision towards which we are working as a parish.

If we have time and space, I’ll ask a bit about how the person understands “Beloved Community” – and the response often has to do with the degree to which we “see and know” each other. One person last year referenced hospitality extended to strangers – for example, guests at a funeral who report back a sense of full-bodied welcome while they are with us. “I don’t feel judged when I’m here,” another person told me late last year. “Truth be told, I’m not the easiest person to get along with sometimes. But I don’t feel judged at church, so maybe that helps me be less judge-y when I’m out in the world?”

I’m grateful for these responses. “Beloved Community” was a term coined by the 19<sup>th</sup> century American idealist philosopher Josiah Royce, but it was refined and broadly circulated by Martin Luther King Jr. The foundation of Beloved Community to King was a particular kind of love: *agape* (uh-GAH-pay). It’s different from romantic love or the love between friends. *Agape* has a lot to do with that primary plank in our Baptismal covenant: it honors unconditionally the dignity of every human person. It’s not love that’s earned, nor is it limited to those we happen to “like.” *Agape* is more of a stance than a feeling, a way of living versus a mood. When Paul asks the Ephesians to “walk in love as Christ loved us” I believe it was *agape* that he was talking about.

*Agape*-infused church communities aren’t simply gatherings of friends. They are places where love and care *within* the community lead us into love and care *beyond* the community. This is why there is a connection in our common life between, for example, our Neighborhood Tables fellowship groups and our Food 4 Kids summer feeding ministry. Between a bible study conversation and a street protest. A healthy church is a church where the God that is seeking us through Word and Sacrament invites us into ever-broadening circles of love and service.

And the nation and the world in which we live needs that love and service perhaps more than it ever has. As 2026 begins, I sense that we are beginning a new period of ministry together – partially in response to the fear, political upheaval and violence we are witnessing in our broader culture, but also as the consequence of focused work and generous giving that have been such a part of our common life in this past year.

In 2025, we:

- Took together an enormous step towards funding our parish ministries into the future. As the first focused fundraising effort in our parish in more than 20 years, ***The Fund for the Future***, with an initial projected goal of \$750,000, raised more than one million dollars. Anticipated investment yield from a portion of this fund will help us fund new and continuing ministries, while another portion will help us make needed capital improvements to our parish hall and fund our planned connection to the Orleans sewer system.
- Called **Rev. Nancy Hagner** to begin a three-year ministry with us in March, 2026. Nancy will work with me on deepening our Christian formation and pastoral ministries, with a particular focus on expanding small-group opportunities for learning and care.
- Welcomed approximately **twenty new people** into the parish, and often on Sundays hosted as many as 140 people for worship.
- **Doubled the number of school-aged parishioners** in our Children’s Ministries community.

- Almost **completed** our long-expected web site revision. Coming soon to a screen near you!
- Revived a **social justice ministry** in response both to the SNAP cuts resulting from the federal government shutdown and a guest preaching visit from Rev. Edwin Johnson of Episcopal City Mission. You'll hear more about this continuing work early in 2026.

Because I've continued this past third year as your sole clergy person, I've been deliberate in inviting other voices into our worship and programming to offer perspectives and styles not my own. I'm thankful for my diocesan colleagues Rev. William Rich and Rev. Cathy George for offering Lenten and Advent Quiet Mornings for us. I'm thankful for Edwin's guest preaching as well as our visit from Sr. Helen Agnes of the Society of Saint Margaret in Duxbury. I give thanks as well to Rev. Anne Koehler and Rev. Elisabeth Tunney in our own parish, who have covered Sundays for me this year during my times away with skill and care. I'm thankful for the ministry and care of our Bishop Diocesan, The Rt. Rev. Julia Whitworth, whose first visitation with us on June 29 was brimming with joy and hope.

Thanks also to Anne Koehler, who with Warden Celia Calhoun has organized and edited the report you are reading now. And to my colleagues on staff: Director of Music Joan Kirchner, Debbi Manning (who has resisted any title I have suggested to her but who ensures that our office runs smoothly and that leaflets appear every Sunday), Facilities Director Wayne Currey and part-time sextons Matthew Harman and Faith Stineford, three who with warmth and generosity make sure that event setup and breakdown and cleaning and so many other forms of help and assistance are here when we need them.

Please keep each of them, as well as our entire church family, in your prayers as we end another year with thanks and begin another year in hope.

### **ADMINISTRATION**

Affinity Group Vestry Liaison – Bill Mason

#### **AV Technical Team**

Mission: The AV Team is primarily responsible for providing our CHS worship services to our YouTube audience. This audience has consisted of parishioners who are unable to be present at the service and members of our parish who reside at The Terraces in Orleans, as well as anyone from the public wishing to view a service at their convenience.

#### Major Accomplishments/Activities in 2025

- We have not made any changes or improvements to our current system of cameras and audio equipment in 2025. However, we have met with Kevin Shanley of East West Associates to research possible improvements to our sound and video system in the Parish Hall and sound system in the church.
- Backup hardware for the wi-fi for the entire campus was replaced in December.

#### Responsibilities/Challenges

- The Team sets up the microphones at each service and monitors the sound levels in the sanctuary and the sound levels on YouTube. They also provide support for functions using the sound system in the Parish Hall.
- In the sanctuary, there are two cameras – one over the central aisle in the north transept leading to the altar and the second over the altar near the organ. A third free-standing camera is available to be used in the church or in the parish hall for special events (i.e. the annual meeting and the MLK breakfast). The Team operates these cameras using the equipment in the AV booth (behind the choir) and uploads the services directly to YouTube.
- The Team also provides support for groups using Zoom in the Fireplace Room. The church computer connects to the sound and video equipment easily for those meetings which include members via Zoom. Debbi Manning is responsible for the church's Zoom schedule.
- Finally, a member of the AV Team has traveled to The Terraces each Sunday with a computer, bulletins, and Communion to facilitate worship there on the large screen tv in the Common Room. Unfortunately, the residents at The Terraces have been forced to find alternative living arrangements, so this opportunity has ended as of December 21.
- Our greatest challenge is to attract more members to our team. Many of our members have multiple duties on a given Sunday. Another challenge lies in the management of our YouTube account to increase our presence there. Our present AV staff has no expertise in this area.

#### **Database and Online Giving**

Mission: Our mission is to create, maintain, and optimize a secure database to facilitate many aspects of our life together, including communication, financial stewardship, pastoral care, and the acknowledgement of key dates in our lives. The online giving platform works in tandem with the database.

### Major Accomplishments/Activities in 2025

- Church membership: Continually updated the database; identified potential new members from non-member giving trends
- Communication: Published periodic updates of our Parish Directory; facilitated snail-mail and other communication to targeted groups
- Financial Stewardship: Issued Giving Statements quarterly, most via email. Forty-six people used online giving to contribute \$75,300 toward pledges and general offering as well as special donations, including \$5,600 for Food 4 Kids. Fourteen people took advantage of the ability to set up recurring donations, either weekly or monthly. ### Major Accomplishments and Activities in 2025

- We coordinated space usage with parishioners and external organizations.
- We maintained and updated the website calendar.
- We worked with the CHS Treasurer to keep the books current.
- We published bulletins and announcements weekly, or as needed.
- We uploaded bulletins, announcements, and Together to the website.
- We created and scheduled Constant Contacts.
- We oversaw the copy machine, computers, and office supplies.
- We oversaw licenses and permits with local and state authorities.
- We maintained current relationships with appropriate vendors and suppliers.

## Sustainability & Stewardship

Mission: Help ensure the long-term financial sustainability of our parish by assisting and advising Vestry with annual pledge campaigns, planned giving programs, capital campaigns, and other sources of revenue. In doing so, we seek to foster a culture of giving which will sustain our church's operations and physical plant, empower our ministries, and fulfill our commitment to serve and support our congregation and our broader community for generations to come.

### Major Accomplishments/Activities in 2025

- Achieved last year's goal of identifying new methods for financial sustainability and supporting the Capital Improvements fund through the design and successful implementation of the Fund for the Future campaign. This campaign had twin goals: to provide financial support for an assistant priest position and to address physical plant and our environmental responsibilities. The campaign exceeded our stretch goals by raising \$1.1 million through the support of 107 participants.
- Achieved last year's goal of sponsoring a successful pledge campaign, including parishioner testimonials, tailored mailings, and strong rector support. As of January 31, 2026 we recorded 149 pledges of financial support for our 2026 calendar year, including xx new pledges. Raised \$420,168 in total dollars pledged, an increase over the prior year of 11%.
- Achieved last year's goal of drafting and implementing a parish gift policy. Realigned the funds invested with the Trustees of Donations (DIT) to this policy to better accommodate both restricted and unrestricted donations.
- Achieved last year's goal of drafting and implementing a parish cash handling policy to better aid with secure handling of parish funds.
- Continued the Neighborhood Tables initiative to bring together small groups of parishioners for worship and community.

### Responsibilities/Challenges

- Build on the launch of the Florence Kimball Society for planned giving with continued celebration of previous givers and education for those interested in participating.
- Launch another successful pledge campaign for 2027.
- Identify new and innovative methods of financial sustainability.
- Continue to refine and expand the Neighborhood Tables initiative.

## Vestry

### Major Accomplishments/Activities in 2025

The Vestry held business meetings 12 times this year, at 6:00-8:00 p.m. on third Thursdays through April, changing to third Tuesdays in May, to accommodate changing needs. Meetings are open to all. Vestry members are assigned an “Affinity Group” of parish groups with whom to maintain contact, and to provide an information flow.

- Held a Friday evening / Saturday Retreat with new members in March, focused on Mutual Ministry Review.
- Supported the B&G Committee again in continuing to update the premises.
- Supported the Sustainability Committee in various projects, including the Stewardship Campaign, the Fund for the Future project and lengthy discussions on providing an Assistant for our Rector, and addressing the housing problem.
- The 4 Officers (2 Wardens, Treasurer and Clerk) and the Rector met at least bi-weekly throughout the year to maintain communication and to support the Rector with all parish tasks.
- We thank Michel Puzo and Jack Sasso for their dedicated work on Vestry for 4 years each.

- Working on getting new members up to speed as quickly as possible following the election of new people to the Vestry.

### **Buildings and Grounds**

Mission: We are a team dedicated to maintaining the buildings and grounds that God has lent to us at CHS. We volunteer our time and talent to love CHS as effective environmental stewards.

### Major Accomplishments/Activities in 2025

- Solar field terraces and hillsides weeded and maintained; new projects underway to cope with water runoff at the main driveway entrance, East parking lot, and the old front entrance.
- Hired professional landscape company to assist in continued with deep grooming of our 4-acre campus, allowing “garden parties” to beautify our grounds.
- Garden parties continued with over 400 volunteer hours across 8 workdays.
- Memorial Garden planting area rehabilitation completed, awaiting possible “pergola” addition.
- Church, Admin building and Parish Hall HVAC systems cleaned and repaired as needed.
- Ecobee thermostats replaced church, admin and Parish Hall old thermostats for better control, monitoring and heat/ac function.
- Replaced boiler #2 in Parish Hall heating system.
- Purchased new commercial refrigerator and freezer for Parish Hall kitchen. Old units repaired and donated to Food 4 Kids ministry.
- Repaired/replaced 25-year-old fire alarm system control board, due to complete failure.

- Campus wide doors, trim and windows inspected, and painting/repairs made where needed.
- Campus wide selected areas have new or repaired gutters to control water intrusion.
- New stairs from parking lot to Kimball House installed.
- Re-shingled south wall of rectory, painted all trim, replaced shutters.

### Responsibilities

- All Buildings & Campus Systems
  - Responsible under the direction of the Rector for a 4+ acre site including all buildings, HVAC systems, plumbing and lighting systems, safety and ADA compliant issues, parking lot maintenance, solar field development and maintenance, building remodeling, renovations, environmental stewardship, and grounds maintenance.
  - Maintain a five-year plan in Excel for repairs and replacement of major systems for budget planning considerations. Prepare annual feeder to Rector/Treasurer/Vestry for budget development.
- Grounds
  - Manage professional landscapers for maintenance.
  - Organize and conduct frequent grounds clean up with volunteers from April-November, typically 1-2x/month.
  - Inspect signs, fencing, parking lot and all outdoor areas for maintenance and repair.
  - Maintain all erosion areas on campus with TerraFirma.
- Projects planned for 2026
  - Parish Hall refresh of painting all rooms on both floors. Approved project scheduled in late January to early February.
  - Upgrade Parish Hall video and sound system for improved site and hearing quality.
  - New stairs and handrail from parking lot to rectory due to safety issues.
  - Re-shingle Monument facing wall from reception room through West transept to avoid water intrusion.
  - Possible replace all Parish Hall chairs with a mix of arm and non-armchairs.
  - Finalize engineering plans for town sewer hookup for main campus and rectory.

### Challenges

- Volunteer committee responsible for prudent management of ~\$100,000+ in direct annual costs of the operating budget at CHS.
- Anticipating and identifying needed replacement elements of complex systems over the next 2-5 years.
- Planning for mandatory connection to Orleans town sewers in 2027/2028. This involves engineering and connection construction for main campus and rectory.
- Securing adequate Cap X funding to accomplish what is needed

### **Health Ministry**

#### Major Accomplishments/Activities in 2025

We resumed meetings this past year, with a summer pause, on the 3rd Tuesday of most months from 12:30-1:30, in person and virtually.

- We were glad to replace the 2nd of 2 AED units, after replacing the 1st in 2024. Both units and accessories are now up to date & fully functional.
- We hosted a Coffee Hour table in April to share our ministry with the congregation, including information on home safety, emergency response, immunization guidelines, Health Care Proxy documentation, along with some community health resources.

#### Mission

#### Major Accomplishments/Activities in 2025

- The newsletter is delivered via email to 344 individual email addresses with an average 67% open rate, which is better than the industry average. We also send hard copies to members who do not have email access.

#### Responsibilities/Challenges

#### Ministry Team

- Every parish ministry contributes articles, and other members supplement the text with wonderful photos. With the help of the Rector and Wardens reviewing and proofreading each issue, we keep everyone informed.

## **Website & Social Media**

#### Mission

- Standardize internal and external information for placement on social media and the website.
- Develop and ensure consistency in branding across internal and external communications – including print advertising.

#### Achievements

- Increase in traffic on the CHS Facebook page – the number of followers is at 1962 (up from 779 in 2024) which is a 173% increase!
- Increase in Facebook page views at 52,451 (up from 32,000 in 2024).
- Reels on Facebook (and Instagram) continued to increase our visibility, providing a creative, fun, and joy-filled way for people to see us.
- Significant increase in numbers of people attending parish events via Facebook posts, reels, and ads in the *Chronicle* and *Provincetown Independent* print and online newspapers.
- Day-to-day changes to the website continue to be handled by the office and volunteers resulting in timely updates and cost savings.
- Use of website as resource for the newsletter, weekly announcements, links to YouTube channel/online services, and our secure portal for pledges and donations.
- Website and our YouTube channel are invaluable resources for those unable to attend services in-person.
- Continued increase in those who say the website or our social media brought them through the doors for services.

#### Challenges

- As technology is always changing, consistency in funneling information across multiple methods of social media will always be a challenge with space for improvement.
- Relaunch of web site is in process but several months behind hoped-for launch schedule.

- Tell our story, our history, and be respectful of the legacy of Galley West

#### Major Accomplishments 2025

- Four Shows with notable increase in the quality and breadth of art with at least 30 artists per show plus many more from Kimball Guild
- Record growth: Statistics vs 2024
  - +20% in entries and +20% in individual artists participating in one or more shows
  - 43% increase in total sales over 2024 including Kimball Guild Sales (+63% over 2024).
- Added Outreach Director, Aline Lindemann, to the Leadership Team. Aline will oversee Gallery social media, website, newsletters, and marketing.

#### Responsibilities/Challenges

- Annual Gallery Team Review Meeting on December 2 identified opportunities to improve gallery procedures, visibility of the gallery to the community, implement more events to attract people to the gallery, continue to increase the number of participating artists.
- Continue to grow the artist community and sales.
- Find ways to bring more visitors to the gallery – promote artists AND Galley West history.
- Have the bandwidth in volunteers to implement activities that will improve gallery results
- Prepare for our 5<sup>th</sup> anniversary on October 16, 2026 and plan a weekend event to include both our CHS and the broader Lower and Outer Cape communities to showcase the gallery and its amazing history.

## **Kimball Guild**

Mission: To continue the long and unique tradition of Hammering at CHS while supporting the Rector's Discretionary Fund.

### Major Accomplishments/Activities in 2025

- Starting the year with a new work bench installation was a huge win for the Guild. We cleaned up the Craft House and reorganized for a much more comfortable workspace.
- We gained another two hammering volunteers that participate regularly. We also held our first workshop, through the gallery, on Dec. 19 with 5 participants. We hope to source more regular hammerers by doing this monthly in 2026.
- The guild has been open for tours during all the Galley West openings and will be again in 2026.
- Estimated total Fund Contributions for 2025 is \$5,020
  - We had a 63% increase in sales at Galley West over 2024. This amounted to total sales of \$5,425 with a net contribution of \$2,712.50 to the Rector's Discretionary Fund.
  - The Guild also raised \$1800 from sales at the annual Bazaar.
  - Our current Christmas market sales through Dec 22 are \$400.
  - This does not include incidental sales we made throughout the year.

### Challenges

- Our only challenge going forward is to continue the momentum of 2025 and keep adding participants!

## **EDUCATION**

### **Adult Christian Formation**

Mission: In addition to *Glimpse of the Gospel*, CHS offers regular opportunities to learn more about our faith and its history, scripture and their interplay with the wider secular cultures in which we live. Both learning series and Sunday forums (with or without guest speakers) are organized by the rector with frequent participation by parishioners on panels or in small group breakout discussions.

### Major Accomplishments/Activities in 2025

- 5-week Lenten Supper Series "Justice, Joy & Daily Bread" exploring Luke's gospel through its recurring references to food and table fellowship. Attended by 55 parishioners.
- Palm Sunday Lecture: *In My Time of Dying* by author Sebastian Junger. Approximately 240 parishioners and wider community members gathered to hear this best-selling author speak from his published account of his near-death experience at Cape Cod Hospital.
- Overnight "Finding a Way" program in June co-hosted on campus with the Harvard Episcopal Chaplaincy and the St. Paul's Center for Theology & Prayer (resident in our diocesan Cathedral). From Friday evening through Sunday morning, 23 parishioners and guests from the wider diocese explored walking as a prayer discipline, with guest leaders Peggy Jablonski of Brewster and Wabin Webquish of the Mashpee Wampanoag Tribe offering deeper understandings of the outer Cape's legacy of historical trauma.

- “Being Dead is No Excuse: planning your own funeral” offered two November sessions for parishioners in which to explore the structure and purpose of the Episcopal Rite of Christian Burial, as well as guidance for planning their own liturgies.
- 11-session Sacred Ground dialog circle series completed in June by 12 parishioners. Using a syllabus and materials assembled by the national Episcopal Church and supported by parishioner co-facilitators Doug Fromm and Nancy Boccia, Sacred Ground explores race and identity in America while linking its history to our faith and family histories. This year’s session brings to approximately 40 the number of parishioners who have completed Sacred Ground.
- Other guest speakers in 2025 included Kristin Andres (Director for Education, Association to Preserve Cape Cod), Max Rasbold-Gabbard from the Massachusetts Department of Health, Rev. Edwin Johnson of Episcopal City Mission and Sr. Helen Agnes of the Society of St. Margaret.

### Challenges and Next Steps

- Welcoming and incorporating our new clergy colleague Nancy Hagner into formation offerings
- Organizing and fostering enhanced small groups for learning and care.
- Identifying and supporting parishioners to serve as small group facilitators
- Additional help needed to create materials and outreach in support of marketing learning opportunities to wider community.

- We have welcomed two new students into our Godly Play program.
- Both the Christmas Pageant and the Epiphany Pageant were attended by students and adults near and far, including alumni as well as family members.
- We are hoping to offer a “Holy Eucharist class” this spring.

### Responsibilities:

- Sharing Godly Play stories with the children 5 years of age up to 11 years of age. Godly Play is storytelling combined with thoughtful questions and dialogue about the story and how it might relate to where the children are and what they have experienced in their lives up until now, as well as how they might explore and change what they do or how they think based on these teachings. The stories are followed with free play, creation (artistry), and a shared snack.
- The Middle/High School group curriculum is similar to Godly Play only we learn how to use (look up) readings in the Bible and then have discussions around a reading for that particular Sunday. This class is taught using the Sunday Paper as well as articles from Faith Lens. There is much discussion and wondering! This class also has a creation section following or during the discussion. We are always thinking about ways in which we are growing and changing and how Jesus/God’s modeling or message can guide us or give us examples to live and learn.

### Challenges:

- How to continue our small classes while drawing new youth and families into our church and church school/youth group!
- Creating church school and youth events that appeal to varied ages since we are such a small group.
- Finding others in the congregation to help with this work. We are a small group and need outside support.

## **Glimpse of the Gospel**

Mission: To provide an opportunity for delving into the scriptures selected for Sunday worship. To share with each other our questions, insights, understandings and personal experiences as we explore these excerpts from scripture. To help each other grow in our commitment to follow Jesus.

### Major Accomplishments/Activities in 2025

The readings for the coming Sunday worship service are emailed in advance to participants and anyone else interested in joining. This allows time during the week for reading, reflection, research before we gather for an hour at 8:45 on Sunday. We meet in the Fireplace Room and by zoom. Each session is begun by praying the Collect for the week. Then the Gospel is read aloud by whoever volunteers. Discussion flows out of the reading. Sometimes we also use the translation from Eugene Peterson's, *The Message*, which can offer insight and guidance. We focus first on the Gospel but often include the other readings for the day. People share how the scriptures impact on their lives and share stories that deepen our awareness and appreciation. The discussion serves as a catalyst for participation in worship; we often wonder after a morning's discussion, "What will Patrick say in his sermon?" We conclude with the prayer attributed to St. Francis, "Make me a channel of your peace."

## **Sacred Ground**

Mission: Sacred Ground is a sensitive, prayerful resource that creates space for difficult but respectful and transformative dialogue on race and racism, issues prevalent in our culture today. It is a registered dialogue series developed by the National Episcopal Church on a protected site requiring a password.

### Program

- The focus is on race and racism in history, culture, politics and economy providing a walk back through the history of Black, Latinos, Indigenous, Asian/Pacific People. The series explores racism as seen through the lens of "White Privilege and White Supremacy." As such the program is tailored for congregations like the Church of the Holy Spirit, predominately white.
- Peeling away layers of the mythology of American History it reveals the often "untold story" of race, providing space for reflection on our own family histories and stories that shaped and shape our views on race and our, often unrealized, advantage of "white privilege".
- The series consists of eleven sessions meeting every other week using readings from two books: *Waking Up White*, by Debby Irving and *The Disinherited*, by Howard Thurman. Documentary films, short videos and articles are used as well.
- Reflections and discussions focus on the materials assigned for each session and are guided by a process of Mutual Invitation where one person leads off by speaking and when finished invites another to speak continuing until all have spoken. When invited to speak one can choose to "pass" without explanation and invite another to speak. After all have spoken, general conversation and sharing continues.
- Sessions last from one and one-half hours on Monday afternoons beginning with a time of quiet, centering and focus concluding with assignments of opening and closing readings or prayer for the next session.

### **Antique Show and Sale**

Mission: The Antique Show has been an annual fundraising event for forty-nine years. It highlights The Church of the Holy Spirit by producing a high-quality antique show with specialty dealers from the New England area. Customers come from Cape Cod as well as off-Cape. Many have never been to our church.

#### Major Accomplishments/Activities in 2025

- Netted \$4,985
- 17 dealers participated in the show and 325+ people attended
- The majority of the dealers brought their wares in and partially set up their booths early Wednesday afternoon prior to Thanksgiving Day
- The CHS team of volunteers expertly handled the gate admissions
- Minimized advertising costs: used signs designed by Brian Schnetzer to advertise the show in multiple neighborhoods on the Cape; Facebook also used to advertise

#### Challenges

- Able to continue to have quality dealers: many retiring due to age
- Managing parking issues, including for the handicapped
- Maintaining/increasing parish member participation for sign placement, gate coverage, etc.

### **Holiday Bazaar**

#### **Mission:**

Each year a team of volunteers works together to produce the event on the first Saturday of November. The bazaar is a major fundraising activity with a percentage of funds designated for outreach programs. The focus is to produce an event that highlights the Church of the Holy Spirit and welcomes guests from all over Cape Cod to shop with unique internal and external vendors, enjoy lunch in the CHS Café, and experience the church through tours and hospitality-focused activities.

#### **Major accomplishments/activities in 2025**

- Exceeded revenue from 2024 by approximately 20% again. We attribute this to increased sales from the food table (we sold out), better and costume jewelry and the success of the Kimball Guild table. We initiated the acceptance of credit cards for all CHS tables – books, jewelry, Kimball Guild, basket tickets and the café. This helped increase sales.
- Once again, we opened the entire lower level, increasing the number of artists/tables. Décor and a hospitality table with cider and cookies enhanced the guest and artist experience.
- There was a marked increase in visitors and shoppers from opening at 9:00 to closing at 2:00 p.m. The atmosphere was so festive, and many attendees commented on the warm and welcoming atmosphere. There was a definite festive and wonderful spirit all day!
- 22 artists and artisans participated.

- Continued with additional activities highlighting the Church of the Holy Spirit (hammering demonstration, scavenger hunt, self-guided tour of the art). These activities were well attended and highlighted the church and community.
- Better jewelry and costume jewelry enjoyed record sales – we developed a new system for cashier/sales and feel this really improved processes.
- Engaged over 80 volunteers, including many newcomers to the church. This is indeed a record, and it was a wonderful community effort!
- Continued to increase FB and other marketing tools, including reels, and added a banner that was hung over main street for the week prior to the sale.
- Clean up and resetting the space was much improved this year with the increase of volunteers.

### **Challenges moving forward**

- The community and volunteers are so committed to the bazaar, and we need to cultivate more volunteers to take lead roles and help alleviate the strain of the set up and prep.
- Examine the efficacy of themed baskets. This year's baskets were of a high value; we raised ticket prices but did not see an increase in sales. We will continue to look for the right balance.
- Managing increased traffic and parking congestion on campus. We did not have a police detail and should do so in the future. We might also want to reach out to our neighbors in advance of the bazaar to be sure they are aware of the activity, and we are respectful of their property, etc.
- Improving website information and traffic. This continues to be a challenge, and we hope to have new website changes to increase information and post an accurate calendar of times.
- Maintaining and increasing team leadership.
- Engage more children/young adults in the planning and day of activities.

## Rummage Sale

### Mission

To produce an outreach event the first weekend of May that builds community by uniting parishioners and neighbors; generates new friendships and strengthens existing ones; offers fun opportunities to volunteers; offers shoppers excellent value and good quality items; conveys The Church of the Holy Spirit positively; benefits a charitable organization with a portion of the proceeds. The Rummage Sale has a long, rich history with a Cape Cod-wide reputation and we hope to always respect its rich past while looking for realistic potential growth.

### Major Accomplishments/Activities in 2025

- We surpassed our financial goal of \$12,000 gross by 48% (the official tally was \$17,761 gross).
- We introduced a Friday afternoon preview, selling tickets for a \$20 donation. More than 50 shoppers and dealers bought tickets allowing them early entrance into the Estate Room. This contributed to just over \$1,000 of the event's gross revenue.
- The Estate Room was overflowing with antiques, collectables, fine art, rugs, and heirloom/better quality items and contributed about 30% of the revenue we raised.
- We had 69 volunteers participating as flier distributors, rummage sorters, organizers, pricers, merchandisers, parking lot attendants, greeters, area supervisors, tabulators, cashiers, and break-down packers and helpers. Volunteers worked one hour to full day shifts, starting in the beginning of April through the end of the sale on May 3. Whether new to the church or seasoned volunteers, feedback was they'll participate again in 2026.
- For the first time, we began accepting donations in the beginning of April, three weeks earlier than usual. This valuable headstart in sorting and organizing also gained us an additional 100+ volunteer hours before the Rummage Sale began set-up.
- We increased our social media presence significantly, targeting more niche markets. (estate sales; antique dealers; collectors; rummage; garage & yard sales)

### Highlights

- We had a record amount of donations this year, for both the Rummage Sale and Estate Room.
- Rev. Patrick Ward, assisted by Steve Coombs, continued the tradition of cooking and serving volunteers a delicious lunch on opening day of the Rummage Sale.
- Food 4 Kids, this year's charitable recipient, joyfully accepted a check for \$1,500 (10% of the event's net revenue)
- We hired police officer detail Friday afternoon for the preview and afternoon hours to assist our parking lot volunteers.

### Responsibilities/Challenges

- Traffic flow and congestion inside the Parish Hall are on-going concerns. The number and placement of merchandise tables is consistent each year
- Try to eliminate duplication of volunteer efforts by creating a master list of flier distribution sites that can be accessed and updated by all.
- There are rummage items and areas that don't sell well, yet use valuable volunteer time (pricing) and floor space, should we eliminate or decrease these and expand areas that do well?
- Recruiting more male parishioners to volunteer, convincing them that the Rummage Sale needs everybody.

#### Major Accomplishments/Activities in 2025

- Presently we read mostly non-fiction, memoirs and any novel the group votes on. Occasionally the leader selects a book.
- We are growing in number. We started with 15 gatherers and are now up to 27. The average size at our meetings is 15.
- One member gives a bio of the author, and another member leads the discussion. Everyone is encouraged to speak.

#### Responsibilities/Challenges

There are no challenges, everyone from CHS is welcome, there are no rules. We meet at members' homes and serve a light supper that members offer to bring and everyone supplies their beverage of choice. - Under Elizabeth Merritt's direction, we took up a collection each month in support of ABC (A Baby Center) in Hyannis. Her neighbor Bonnie Adams helps with the buying of baby diapers and wipes, and Margaret Anne and Bill Huess transport them to Hyannis, where they are gratefully received. (Bonnie Adams has made several beautiful handmade quilts for the center as well.)

### Responsibilities/Challenges

- We meet in the Parish Hall about 11:45 on the first Thursday of most months and convene at 12:00.
- We bring our own sandwiches or salads and the rest is provided. Volunteers bring chips, juice, and dessert; Wayne makes the coffee, and we bring paper goods and centerpieces to decorate the tables.

## **LARGER FAITH COMMUNITY**

### **Cape & Islands Deanery**

**Mission:** Support of parishes (regionally/locally) in the mission and ministry of the diocese.

#### **Major Accomplishments/Activities in 2025:**

Four Deanery Assembly meetings were held during the year, two only on Zoom and two both in person and on Zoom.

- On January 23<sup>rd</sup> the Zoom call was convened by The Rev. Max Wolf (St. Paul’s, Nantucket). Several reports were presented. The program for the evening was a presentation by The Rev. Lynn Campbell (Church of the Advent, Medfield) on their experience with the Holy Cow! Survey used in searches for clergy (CHS used this tool in 2021).
- On March 27<sup>th</sup> the Zoom call was convened by Celia Calhoun (Church of the Holy Spirit, Orleans). Reports were presented and the Nominating Committee reported that their work was complete for elections in May. The program for the evening, led by Dean Dan Bernier, was a discussion on Jesus’ ministry, focusing on whom Jesus spent his time with – and therefore how we should be spending our time in this challenging political climate.
- On, May 29<sup>th</sup> an Assembly was held at The Church of the Messiah, Woods Hole. This was the Assembly’s annual meeting where reports were given plus a report by the Nominating Committee (including CHS’ Kate Paradise) presented the slate of new officers for 2025-26, and new members for the Nominating Committee. All were approved. Assembly dates for the coming year were set: Thursdays, 9/25/25, 1/29/26, 3/26/26 and 5/28/26. The program included a discussion on Social Justice Ministries led by Max Wolf.
- The second in-person Assembly was held on Thursday, September 25<sup>th</sup> and included a potluck BBQ followed by a Prayer and Praise Revival, with the singing of many Christian praise songs.
- All are welcome to attend these Assemblies but only delegates are able to vote.

### **Responsibilities and Challenges:**

- Traveling to several locations throughout the year. Zoom calls help but are impersonal and it is difficult to establish working relationships. Hybrid meetings increase the difficulty as some members are present in person and others are online.

## **Cape Cod Council of Churches**

Mission: The Cape Cod Council of Churches serves people of all ages from Cape Cod and the Islands who are facing some of life's most difficult challenges: "*Serving God by serving others,*" as we offer practical assistance, spiritual support and hope – all without regard to religious affiliation.

### Major Accomplishments/Activities in 2025

- The ministries at the Council, for over 60 years, work to meet people at their points of critical need, helping them to move forward to greater stability. The CCCC is able to be involved in the lives of over 11,000 residents each year through its six different programs and the work of over 400 volunteers.
- At CHS and spearheaded by Elizabeth Merritt and the CHS Ladies' Lunch group, raised approximately \$180/month to purchase diapers and baby wipes for A Baby Center in Hyannis. This vital program serves marginalized young mothers with infant children.

### Responsibilities/Challenges

Edye Naismith, Executive Director, reports that 2025 has been a tough year for the Council's varied programs due to the federal budget cuts, which have supported its mission in the past. She is grateful for the financial support that CHS's Outreach Committee continues to offer year after year.

The Council provides support for:

- A Baby Center – Cape & Islands
- Covenant to Care for Foster Families – Cape & Islands: supporting those families and the foster children in their care, working with the MA Department of Children & Families
- Faith Family Kitchen – Hyannis: provides hot, nutritious meals to our food insecure neighbors three evenings a week in Hyannis
- Hands of Hope Food Pantry and Outreach Center – Dennis Port: offers emergency assistance to low-income families in the mid-Cape area including food, clothing, small household goods and financial relief to prevent evictions
- Homeless Ministries, Here Now Ministries, and Youth StreetReach – Hyannis: build bridges with homeless and local housed and unhoused neighbors
- Hospital Chaplaincy: sponsors a chaplain at Spaulding Rehabilitation Hospital, who offers prayers, hope and comfort to patients and families in their time of illness and recovery

As we look forward to 2026, we are happy to announce that Edye Naismith, the Executive Director of the Cape Cod Council of Churches will again be with us on Sunday, May 17th to speak at the 10 AM service, just prior to our scheduled Outreach Fair in the Parish Hall.

## Diocese of Massachusetts 240<sup>th</sup> Annual Convention

“The Hope to which we are Called”

November 14-15, 2025

**Mission:** The Diocesan Convention is the primary representative governing body of the diocese. It convenes annually in November to conduct diocesan business, including election of officers and members of various leadership bodies; approval of a budget for the upcoming year; setting mission strategy; and establishing diocesan policy and procedure by considering and voting on resolutions and approving changes to the diocesan constitution and canons. It is also an occasion for communication and teaching from the bishop; learning about and participating in shared mission and ministry; fellowship, community building and common prayer; and celebration of the Holy Eucharist together as a diocesan community.

### Highlights:

- An inspiring keynote speech The Most Rev. Melissa Skelton, most recently Bishop Provisional in the Episcopal Diocese of Olympia, on congregational development and the importance of churches understanding their purpose. “No one had ever introduced the concept of ‘purpose’ to me and my impression of church was ‘spinning plates’—the rush of energy that requires you to be busy all of the time,” says Bishop Skelton. In her keynote, she presented a Gather, Transform, Send model that helps congregations develop and articulate their core identity, as a way to deepen who they are, and appeal to newcomers most suited to their church.
- Bishop Whitworth emphasized the critical work that was done over the past few years, with input from more than 800 people, on diocesan core values, mission, and priorities. She highlighted a range of commitments that came out of the visioning work, including hiring Hispanic and Justice missionaries; hiring a Canon for Communications, Witness, and Engagement; supporting congregations in best utilizing real estate and with operational structures; and committing resources to formation throughout the diocese, including youth formation “the church of today.” Bishop Whitworth closed by introducing an Immigrant Legal Emergency Fund she has seeded with the Bishop’s Discretionary Fund, challenging those at the Convention to raise \$10,000—which was accomplished—on Saturday to bring the fund to more than \$100,000 to help immigrants with urgent needs.
- Presentation of the diocese’s first Courage and Joy Awards to four outstanding recipients.
- Workshops on a range of topics, from Invite, Welcome, Connect to Managing Church Property for Mission, tied the diocese’s strategic vision.
- As part of its public witness, several resolutions were passed, including affirming human rights for all people in US prisons and detention centers; supporting the Massachusetts’ immigrant community, especially those at risk of losing temporary protected status; and affirming support for the MA Indigenous Legislative Agenda.

## Nauset Interfaith Association

Our mission is to deepen our mutual understanding of our faiths; provide mutual support and understanding for each other; and work together for justice in our wider community, especially by standing with the poor, marginalized and oppressed.

Major accomplishments and activities in 2025

- Annual MLK Breakfast
- Several events engaging with indigenous residents of Cape Cod regarding environmental practices and principles.
- Raising community awareness of gender identify issues among youth and mitigating increasing suicidal and marginalization thoughts.
- Engaging and supporting migrants who have moved to Cape Cod from the Caribbean, Africa, Central and South America, Ukraine and other places.

## **Outreach Committee**

First, we want to thank all our parishioners for their support for the Outreach that The Church of the Holy Spirit provides to those in need. There is still more to do.

Mission: The primary mission of our committee is to provide outreach to people in need who reside on Cape Cod. We also will help others in the greater world through Americares who have an excellent track record in providing aid.

### Major accomplishments /activities in 2025

- We adjusted our giving this year to the realities on the ground. The needs on the Cape have been our main focus with only the fires in Los Angeles getting some of our funds. We made grants to 20 agencies on Cape Cod as well as the Diocese of Los Angeles.
- When we can, we give to Americares which helps with disasters across the globe. One of our most successful ventures has been giving to the Endupoto Elementary School in Tanzania where we help over 800 students get an education. The program helps provide an excellent education and one who began at the school when he was 9 is now in his second year of medical school.
- Transitions: Chip Bechtold, long-time Co-Chair, has moved and Sally Dewing has stepped down. Brooke Skea stepped up to become Co-Chair with Phil. She will do a great job. We still needed additional members and Carol Richardson and Jeane deCervens have joined the Committee. We welcome them heartily. We have a new Vestry liaison – Carol Baffi-Dugan stepped in and has added to our deliberations. We welcome all these people as they will make sure we are able to continue our work.

### Responsibilities

- Disperse funds received from fund-raising events (Bazaar and Rummage Sale) and funds set up by former parishioners (Badger/Morgan Heed Fund and Hagenbuckle Fund). We receive funds from the Parish budget, from funds set up by former parishioners such as the Badger/Morgan Heed fund and the Hagenbuckle Fund, and a tithe on the fund-raising events such as the Bazaar, Rummage sale and the Antiques fair.
- Carefully screen agencies as to their mission viability and need. Members liaison to the agencies we support and keep our committee aware of the agencies' needs, activities and accomplishments. We require an annual questionnaire and financials from each agency outlining some of their specific needs and desires.
- Provide additional help through volunteerism.
- Hold a Ministry Fair for the Parish to have the opportunity to put the names of the agencies and the work they do with faces of the people who dispense the aid we help supply. It also provides an opportunity for agencies to network with each other. (Our next Ministry Fair will be coming in May.)

### Challenges

- To involve parish members more fully in the activities of the agencies we support.
- We are always looking for new people. Meetings are open to all on the first Thursday of each month at 1:30 in the Fireplace room.
